# Worship at Home The Second Sunday before Advent Led by the Anglican Communion

### WELCOME

Archbishop Josiah Idowu-Fearon, Secretary-General of the Anglican Communion offers a brief word of welcome from the main door of Lambeth Palace

Good morning. My name is Archbishop Josiah Idowu-Fearon and I am the Secretary-General of the Anglican Communion; it is my pleasure to welcome you to Lambeth Palace, home of the Archbishop of Canterbury, for our worship this morning, which celebrates the joy of connectedness of the Anglican Communion, a family of churches in more than 165 countries. Many in the Communion had hoped to be meeting back in August for the Lambeth Conference, which sadly couldn't happen this year due to the global health pandemic; however, we are looking forward to seeing one another at the rearranged conference in 2022.

Lambeth Palace itself plays a part in the rich history of the Anglican Communion; from the Chapel here, bishops have been sent out to minister across the Communion.

Good morning, I am Anthony Poggo and I work here at Lambeth Palace as the Archbishop of Canterbury's Adviser on Anglican Communion Affairs; before this I was Bishop of Kajo-Keji in South Sudan. Our service today will tell us about friendships that cross continents and how communities in different parts of the world support one another in hard times and share in one another's joys in good times. The Anglican Communion has close links to Lambeth Palace; in the study above me, Archbishop Cranmer compiled the Book of Common Prayer, which still forms the basis of all our worship in the Anglican Church today. In the various chairs and stalls we use in this Chapel there are beautiful enamel plaques representing most of the different provinces in the Anglican Communion, a visual reminder of our sisters and brothers around the world, some of whom we will be hearing from during this service today.

Our preacher for this service is Sheran Harper, President of the Mothers Union, an organisation present in 84 countries around the world. We will also hear from the Women on the Frontline project and about companion link Dioceses across the Communion.

Mr Jeroham Melendez (read in Spanish)

A reading from the First Letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians. (5.1-11)

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, 'There is peace and security', then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labour pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. ### HOLY GOSPEL Read in Arabic by the Very Rev. Dr. Hosam Naoum, Bishop in the Diocese of Jerusalem

A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew. (25.14-30)

'For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, "Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents." His master said to him, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master."
