Foreword:

Cathedrals are vibrant centres of spiritual life and music for people of all ages and backgrounds. Children are welcomed Music with their families and their schools. Cathedrals are central to many civic events and attract visitors to their beautiful historical buildings.

For tourists, cathedrals can convey a sense of the spiritual and sacred even to those who are on the margins of Christian faith, or who stand some way beyond1

This year's data continue to show the growth seen over the last decade, especially attendance at midweek services. One off questions this year focused on the provision of children's and youth activities, planned giving and bible study.

Attendance

In 2012 the average number of adults and children attending Cathedral services each week was 35,800. This has increased by 35% since 2002; almost all the increase in attendance in the past decade is due to increased midweek attendance rising from 8,900 in 2002 to 16,800 in 2012 (table 1).

The community roll has increased over the same period from 14,300 in 2002 to 16,800 in 2012 (table 10).

Easter and Christmas

Average attendance at each cathedral in 2012 was 1,300 at Easter and 2,800 at Christmas.

Attendance at Easter in 2012 was 54,700, the highest figure in the last decade. Attendance over the Holy Week increased slightly from 105,700 in 2011 to 107,700 in 2012 (table 2).

Christmas attendance fluctuates depending on the day it falls, with higher attendees when Christmas day falls at the weekend. In 2012 Christmas day was a Tuesday. Attendance fell from 129,100 in 2011 when Christmas was on a Sunday by 10% to 117,200 in 2012 (table 3). Many cathedrals conduct additional services over the Christmas period to meet high demand.

Services during Advent, the period leading up to Christmas, attracted an attendance of 745,900 (table 3). There were approximately 30,000 communicants at Christmas (table 3) and at Easter (table 2) representing 27% and 50% respectively of those attending. The number of communicants varies much less than attendance from year to year and is less dependent on the day of the week that Christmas falls on.

Baptisms, Marriages and Thanksgiving

In 2012 there were 760 baptisms and thanksgivings for the birth of a child conducted in cathedrals. The number of baptisms of young people (over 13 years of age), adults and children aged between 1 and 12 has increased considerably since 2002, rising from 300 baptisms in 2002 to 430 in 2009 before falling slightly to 410 in 2012 (table 4), infant baptisms remain stable. Overall, these figures reflect the national trend as reported in Statistic for Misson 2011. The number of marriages conducted in cathedrals has shown a steady increase over the decade rising from 270 couples in 2002 to 340 in 2011 and 2012 (table 4). Since 2006 the number of blessings after marriage has declined vear on vear.

There were 400 funerals and a further 100 memorial services conducted by cathedral clergy (table 4). The number of funerals conducted by cathedrals has remained constant over the last ten years. In 2012, there were 110 funerals conducted at crematoria, a sharp increase from the proceeding five years which averaged 60 services at crematoria per year.

Children and Young People

In 2012, 306,800 children and young people visited cathedrals and further 12,350 visited Westminster Abbey. Over half of these visits were children under 11 years old (Nursery/KS1 and Primary/KS2, table 5). The number of children and young people attending educational events at cathedrals has increased by 15% since 2002 from 265,000 to 306,800 in 2012.

Cathedrals support the education of 11.000 children at schools associated with cathedrals (table 6). In 2012, 1,040 children attended cathedral run Sunday schools, 350 were in youth groups and 130 children were admitted to communion before Confirmation (table 9).

It should be noted that there was not a full response to questions from cathedrals about provision of children's and vouth activities.

Almost 2,000 child and adult choristers were involved in providing Cathedral music traditions (table 11) in 2012. In addition, 690 children (under 16 years of age) were involved in singing in other Cathedral choirs and 1420 adults were involved in voluntary choirs (table 12).

There are 60 male choirs; 40 female choirs and 90 mixed choirs singing in Church of England cathedrals (table 12).

Volunteers and Supporting Cathedrals

Over the last ten years the number of volunteers involved in the mission and ministry of cathedrals has increased by 30% to 15.600, the highest in a decade. In each cathedral, there are on average 360 volunteers. Volunteers fulfil 860 voluntary roles across the country (table 10), an average of 20 in each cathedral.

14,600 congregation members participate in planned giving (table 10) financially supporting the running of cathedrals.

Visitors

Over the last ten years, the number of visitors reported has gradually reduced by 1.4 million to just under 10 million. Including Westminster Abbey and other Royal Peculiars, our working estimate of the total number of visitors to Cathedrals remains at approximately 12 million (table 10).

Services and events within the year

Specially arranged services and public/civic events are not included in average weekly attendance figures as they are not part of the weekly calendar of services:

Regular services conducted at least monthly (including fresh expressions and schools services) attracted 1.6 million people (table 7).

3,000 specially arranged services, celebrating specific events, (table 8) were conducted by cathedrals in 2012, these attracted 930,000 people (table 7).

Slightly more than a million people (table 7) attended more than 5,000 public/civic events (table 8) arranged in cathedrals. Over the last ten years both the numbers of public/civic events and specially arranged services have increased (table 8). The number of people attending public/civic events remains double that of 648,000 in 2002 to 1,098,300 in 2012 (table 7), after a high of 1.842,400 in 2011.

Outside of regular services, 5900 young people and adults attended bible study and other groups in 2012 (table 9).

Definitions and notes

While many figures in this booklet have been **rounded**, totals and averages were calculated before rounding. Thus row and column totals will not always agree exactly with the sum of the stated amounts.

42 Cathedrals and Westminster Abbey participated in this exercise.

Specific figures for Westminster Abbey, being a Royal Peculiar are not included in the charts and tables but as notes below the charts.

Cathedral figures reported in this booklet have been collated from the annual cathedral returns completed each year by head vergers/cathedral administrators and deans on behalf of Association of English Cathedrals.

Marriages	Marriages are of "couples newly married".
Prayer and Dedication	Prayer and dedication of marriage are of couples for whom a service of blessing (after civil marriage) was held in the cathedral and does not include the renewal of vows.
Average Attendance on a Sunday and Midweek	Average number of attendees in a normal service which is not a major festival or contained in a peak holiday period.
Community Roll	Number of persons on the Community Roll as presented to the Annual Cathedral Meeting. Those entitled to have their names entered upon the roll of the cathedral who are lay members of either sex of seventeen years of age and over, who are baptised and are resident in the cathedral or, if not resident, have habitually attended public worship in the cathedral during a period of six months prior to enrolment.
Schools	Schools or academies which are part of Cathedral governance or have formal links/relationship with the Cathedral during the academic year.
Educational Visits	Number of children attending organised educational events which take place either in the Cathedral or organised by the Cathedral and took place elsewhere.
Choristers	Number of boys, girls and adult lay clerks/choral scholars at year end.
Peculiar	Used of a church that is outside the parochial (parish) system, into which the vast majority of churches fit. Peculiars are practically all royal peculiars, the appointment of whose minister is directly in the hands of the Sovereign. Examples are Westminster Abbey and St George's Chapel, Windsor.
Planned giving	Number of congregation members at calendar year end date participating in planned giving, relating to money given regularly through a standing order, envelope scheme, direct debit and regular gift aid users.
Visitors	Visitors are defined as either people paying or donating at the point of entry or those who do not pay but possibly donate at alms box (excluding those who attend services and events.) Canterbury, London, York and Westminster Abbey fall within the most popular and important cathedrals as published under the "Association of Leading Visitor Attractions" (ALVA). Visitor numbers for these cathedrals and royal peculiar have been taken from ALVA's website. From 2011, York Minster no longer falls within this range.

In 2012 the average number of adults and children attending Cathedral services each week was nearly 36,000. This has increased by 35% since 2002.



Almost all the increase in attendance in the past decade is due to increased midweek attendance rising from 8,900 in 2002 to 16,800 in 2012.

The normal attendance at cathedral weekday services was 12,400 adults and 4,400 children and young people.



² A service is one which is not a major festival or contained in a peak holiday period. If the attendance fluctuates an annual 'average' should be given. Persons attending more than one service on the same day should, wherever possible, be counted only once no matter how many services they attend.

³ Mid week count only includes services held Monday - Saturday and excludes Sunday Services.



In 2012 Christmas day was a Tuesday. Attendance fell by 10% from 129,100 in 2011 when Christmas was on Sunday to 117,200. Many cathedrals conduct additional services over the Christmas period to meet high demand. Services during Advent, the period leading up to Christmas, attracted an attendance of 745,900.

There were approximately 30,000 communicants at Christmas and at Easter representing 27% and 50% respectively of total attendance. The number of communicants varies much less than attendance from year to year and is less dependent on the day of the week that Christmas falls on.









Over the last ten years both the numbers of public/civic events and specially arranged services have increased. In particular, the number of people attending public/civic events has remained double that of 648,000 in 2002 to 1,098,300 in 2012, after reaching a high of 1,842,400 in 2011⁵.

In 2012, 1,040 children attended cathedral run Sunday schools, 350 were in youth groups, 130 children were admitted to communion before Confirmation, 5,900 young people and adults attended bible study and other groups and 14,600 congregation members participated in planned giving financially supporting the running of cathedrals.






