### HERE'S AN IDEA...

Enjoy the daily Generosity Week mailings from York and Newcastle dioceses. York has a video of the Archbishop of York, who talks movingly about the qualities of generosity he observed over the period of the late Queen's funeral. Sammi Tooze from York has been talking on the radio about what they're doing for Generosity Week (starts at 1hr 39m 52s).

At the time of writing, Newcastle has explored hospitality and generous care, with awe-inspiring and yet ordinary stories of people like you and me doing wonderful things. Newcastle also gives us suggestions for ways we can all be catalysts for change.

If you ever need help with finding suitable pictures, royalty-free music or logos for Church of England campaigns, visit the Resource Hub within AChurchNearYou.com. It's updated regularly with new material and you can even customise videos within it – including one for Generosity Week.

A Church Near You is also hosting the Church Development Tool which is a short anonymous survey a church asks its worshipping community to complete. It is designed to help churches discover what they're good at and what support congregations would like to grow and share their faith. Join a webinar to find out more here.

## RESOURCE OF THE WEEK.....

The Generous Church Check Up is a helpful start in looking at a church's finances, designed to be used by the PCC, or finance committee, or any other group of interested people. It's only 3 pages long and asks 14 broad-brush questions about different areas of finance; covering reserves, legacies, community engagement, preaching and more. There are no right or wrong answers, but completing the Check Up will highlight areas where improvements can be made, as well as giving encouragement in other areas.

Many churches use the Generous Church Check Up every year, to start to build a picture of the progress they're making. Doing it in January or February can help start the year in a positive light, and it also means that the findings can feed into discussions at the APCM.
