3Enter his gates with thanksgiving

give thanks to him and bless his name.

The Word of God

Psalmody

The appointed psalmody is said.

Psalm 145.1-13

Refrain: Great is the Lord and highly to be praised.

- 1 I will exalt you, O God my King, ☐ and bless your name for ever and ever.
- 2 Every day will I bless you
 and praise your name for ever and ever.
- 3 Great is the Lord and highly to be praised; \square his greatness is beyond all searching out. R
- 4 One generation shall praise your works to another \square and declare your mighty acts.
- 5 They shall speak of the majesty of your glory, \square and I will tell of all your wonderful deeds.
- 6 They shall speak of the might of your marvellous acts, \square and I will also tell of your greatness.
- 7 They shall pour forth the story of your abundant kindness
 and joyfully sing of your righteousness.
- 8 The Lord is gracious and merciful, \square long-suffering and of great goodness. R
- 9 The Lord is loving to everyone \square and his mercy is over all his creatures.
- 10 All your works praise you, O Lord, □ and your faithful servants bless you.
- 11 They tell of the glory of your kingdom

 and speak of your mighty power,
- 12 To make known to all peoples your mighty acts \square and the glorious splendour of your kingdom.
- 13 Your kingdom is an everlasting kingdom;

 your dominion endures throughout all ages. R

Refrain: Great is the Lord and highly to be praised.

King of the universe,
you show the bright glory of your reign
in acts of mercy and enduring love;

raise the spirits of the downcast and restore those who have fallen away, that we may sing for ever of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

as it was in the beginning is now and shall be for ever. Amen.

If there are two Scripture readings, the first may be read here, or both may be read after the canticle.

Isaiah 49.1-7

Listen to me, O coastlands,

pay attention, you peoples from far away!

The Lord called me before I was born,
while I was in my mother's womb he named me.

He made my mouth like a sharp sword,
in the shadow of his hand he hid me;
he made me a polished arrow,
in his quiver he hid me away.

And he said to me, 'You are my servant,
Israel, in whom I will be glorified.'

But I said, 'I have laboured in vain,
I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity;
yet surely my cause is with the Lord,

And now the Lord says,

who formed me in the womb to be his servant,

to bring Jacob back to him,

and that Israel might be gathered to him,

for I am honoured in the sight of the Lord,

and my God has become my strength—

and my reward with my God.'

he says,

'It is too light a thing that you should be my servant

to raise up the tribes of Jacob

and to restore the survivors of Israel;

I will give you as a light to the nations,

that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth.'

Thus says the Lord,

the Redeemer of Israel and his Holy One,

to one deeply despised, abhorred by the nations,

the slave of rulers,

'Kings shall see and stand up,

princes, and they shall prostrate themselves,

because of the Lord, who is faithful,

the Holy One of Israel, who has chosen you.'

Canticle

A Song of the New Jerusalem, or another suitable canticle, for example, number 31 (page 582) or number 36 (page 587), may be said

Refrain:

AllAbove you the Holy One arises,

and above you God's glory appears.

1Arise, shine out, for your light has come, □

the glory of the Lord is rising upon you.

2Though night still covers the earth, □

and darkness the peoples;

3Above you the Holy One arises, $\ensuremath{\mathbb{D}}$

and above you God's glory appears.

4The nations will come to your light, □

and kings to your dawning brightness.

5Your gates will lie open continually, □

shut neither by day nor by night.

6The sound of violence shall be heard no longer in your land, \square or ruin and devastation within your borders.

7You will call your walls, Salvation, \square and your gates, Praise.

8No more will the sun give you daylight, \square nor moonlight shine upon you;

9But the Lord will be your everlasting light, □ your God will be your splendour.

10For you shall be called the city of God, □ the dwelling of the Holy One of Israel.

Scripture Reading

One or more readings appointed for the day are read.

The reading(s) may be followed by a time of silence.

Acts 16.11-15

We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshipper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, 'If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home.' And she prevailed upon us.

A suitable song or chant, or a responsory in this or another form, may follow

let the whole earth tremble before him.

Gospel Canticle

The Benedictus (The Song of Zechariah) is normally said, or A Song of the Blessed (page 606) may be said

Refrain:

AllThis is the Christ, the Chosen of God,

the one who will bring healing to the nations.

1Blessed be the Lord the God of Israel, □

who has come to his people and set them free.

2He has raised up for us a mighty Saviour, []

born of the house of his servant David.

3Through his holy prophets God promised of old □

to save us from our enemies,

from the hands of all that hate us,

4To show mercy to our ancestors, \square

and to remember his holy covenant.

5This was the oath God swore to our father Abraham: []

to set us free from the hands of our enemies,

6Free to worship him without fear, □

holy and righteous in his sight

all the days of our life.

7And you, child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, □ for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way,

8To give his people knowledge of salvation \square

by the forgiveness of all their sins.

9In the tender compassion of our God □

the dawn from on high shall break upon us,

10To shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, \square and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

Luke 1.68-79
