#### Summary

Cathedrals and greater churches offer a complementary ministry, which can strategically promote the mission and work of their dioceses in proclaiming the gospel, worshipping God, and engaging with others. The rich ministry of cathedrals was recognised with growth factors listed in the 'Cathedrals, Greater Churches and the growth of the church report of 2013' - Initiating new services and congregations, improving welcome and hospitality, increasing civic profile, engaging in culture & arts, enriching the quality of worship, developing educational programmes, promoting spiritual openness, inclusivity and diversity and enriching the quality of worship.

The statistics in this report reflect the changing patterns of midweek attendance in cathedrals over the past decade.

One off questions this year focused on events/services supported by cathedral clergy and choir; and the number of occasions in which cathedral staff participated in diocesan meetings, formal inter faith forums and ecumenical events.

#### Attendance & Weekly Services

For the first time, the attendance report is divided according to the nine regions of England. Cathedral growth is most common in areas of migration, economic and population growth. Cathedrals situated at the heart of lively, growing cities or those located along a tourists' throughway have greater opportunities for growth than those situated away from flourishing centres of population and economic development.

Many regions are seeing signs of growth in attendance at their cathedrals but growth trends are not evenly distributed across England. The three regions showing the strongest growth are Yorkshire and the Humber, London and the South East. Key aspects of growth identified were cultivating a sense of community; quality of worship, service, preaching and music; exploring new patterns of services; exploring spiritual openness and emphasis on families and young people. (tables 1 - 4).

In 2014 the average number of adults and children attending Cathedral services each week was 36,600. This has increased by 22% since 2004. The number of people attending regular services on Sundays in Cathedrals has remained stable over the last decade. Growth is seen in weekday attendance rising from 11,400 in 2004 to 19,500 in 2013 and then falling to 18,500 in 2014. The highest motivating factors for Cathedral attendance were peace and contemplation, worship and music and friendly atmosphere.

#### Easter and Christmas

There were approximately 27,100 communicants at Easter. The number of communicants varies much less than attendance from year to year. Average attendance at each cathedral in 2014 was 1,260 at Easter. Attendance at Easter in 2014 was 53,100, slightly lower than the previous year. (table 5).

There were approximately 32,300 communicants at Christmas. The number of communicants varies much less than attendance from year to year and is less dependent on the day of the week on which Christmas falls. Average attendance at each cathedral in 2014 was 2,970 at Christmas (table 6).

124,800 people attended Christmas Eve/Day services, which is a slight increase on 2013. Many cathedrals conducted additional services over the Christmas period to meet high demand. Services during Advent, the period leading up to Christmas, attracted an attendance of 630,600 in 2014. Christmas attendance fluctuates depending on the day on which it falls and the weather. In general, attendance is greater when Christmas day falls at the weekend.

#### Baptisms, Marriages and Thanksgiving

In 2014 there were 760 baptisms and 18 thanksgivings conducted in cathedrals. The number of baptisms of people over 1 year of age has increased considerably since the year 2004, rising from 340 baptisms in 2004 to 450 in 2014. Since 2012, infant baptisms have been falling steadily. Overall, these figures reflect the national trend.

The number of marriages conducted in cathedrals was generally stable between 2004 and 2014. The number of blessings for newly married couples has been generally declining during the last decade.

The number of funerals conducted by cathedrals has remained reasonably stable over the last ten years.

#### **Children and Young People**

The number of children and young people attending educational events at cathedrals increased by 13.9% over the period 2004 to 2014. Over half of these visits were children under 11 years old (Nursery/Pre-prep and Primary/Pre). In 2013, however, the number of educational visits was the highest recorded at 321,700 falling to 309,400 (the second highest recorded) in 2014. Educational visits at Westminster Abbey were 13,400 in 2014.

Cathedrals support the education of 9,240 children at schools associated with cathedrals.

#### Music

At the centre of the life of the cathedral is the daily offering of worship and praise. Almost 2,000 child and adult choristers were involved in providing traditional choral music in 2014 and an additional 2,000 children and adult involved in voluntary choirs. (table 14).

1,450 child choristers and 470 paid professional adults provided traditional choral music in 2014. In addition, 540 children and 1,420 adults were involved in voluntary choirs. Cathedrals have continued to welcome visiting choirs and orchestras from around the world. In 2014, there were 40 male, 30 female, 70 mixed choirs and 820 visiting choirs reported.

Cathedrals are now a very popular venue for concerts. There were over 1,000 regular musicians involved in services:- 300 boys, 280 girls, 310 men and 120 women. There were an additional 580 occasional musicians:- 60 boys, 50 girls, 250 men and 220 women.

#### Volunteers and Supporting Cathedrals

Over the last ten years the number of volunteers involved in the mission and ministry of cathedrals has increased from 12,400 in 2004 to 15,200 in 2014. Cathedral could not operate at the level of excellence or activity that it does without them. (table 10).

#### Services and events within the year

Regular services conducted at least once a month (including fresh expressions and schools services) attracted almost half a million people. Over 1.1 million people attended 6,230 public/civic events held in cathedrals. 2,770 specially arranged services were conducted by cathedrals in 2014 and these attracted 919,100 people.

Cathedrals continue to enjoy partnerships with a number of universities and colleges by hosting award ceremonies throughout the year. It is an important part of maintaining valued and long-held relationships with these higher-educational establishments. Also, these events strengthen ties with the community and generate revenue. Schools continue to visit Cathedrals to mark special commemorative dates in their calendar year. The number of specially arranged school services rose from 90 in 2010 to 520 in 2014.

#### Additional activities supported by Cathedral

In 2014, there were over 2,110 occasions in which Cathedral clergy/people participated in diocesan meetings/events; 1,650 events/services supported by clergy away from the cathedral; approximately 300 events/services supported by the Cathedral choir away from the cathedral; 280 occasions in which cathedral people participated in formal inter faith forums and events and 490 occasions of participation in ecumenical events.

It should be noted that there was not a full response to these questions

#### Visitors

Cathedral promotes spiritual openness, inclusivity and diversity in membership and outreach, the number of visitors is 9.6 million. Including Westminster Abbey, the total number of visitors to cathedrals in 2014 was over 10 million.

#### Acknowledgements

#### **Definitions and notes**

While many figures in this booklet have been **rounded**, totals and averages were calculated before rounding. Thus row and column totals will not always agree exactly with the sum of the stated amounts.

42 Cathedrals and Westminster Abbey participated in this exercise.

Specific figures for Westminster Abbey, being a Royal Peculiar are not included in the charts and tables but as notes below the charts.

Cathedral figures reported in this booklet have been collated from the annual cathedral returns completed each year by head vergers/cathedral administrators and deans on behalf of the Association of English Cathedrals.

Marriages	Marriages are of "couples newly married".
Prayer and Dedication	Prayer and dedication of marriage are of couples for whom a service of blessing (after civil marriage) was held in the cathedral and does not include the renewal of vows.
Average Attendance on a Sunday and Midweek	Average number of attendees in a normal service which is not a major festival or contained in a peak holiday period.
Community Roll	Number of persons on the Community Roll as presented to the Annual Cathedral Meeting. Those entitled to have their names entered upon the roll of the cathedral who are lay members of either sex of seventeen years of age and over, who are baptised and are resident in the cathedral or, if not resident, have habitually attended public worship in the cathedral during a period of six months prior to enrolment.
Schools	Schools or academies which are part of Cathedral governance or have formal links/relationship with the Cathedral during the academic year.
Educational Visits	Number of children attending organised educational events which take place either in the Cathedral or organised by the Cathedral and take place elsewhere.
Choristers	Number of boys, girls and adult lay clerks/choral scholars at year end.
Peculiar	Used of a church that is outside the parochial (parish) system, into which the vast majority of churches fit. Peculiars are practically all royal peculiars, the appointment of whose minister is directly in the hands of the Sovereign. Examples are Westminster Abbey and St George's Chapel, Windsor.
Activities of Cathedral people	Number of events/services supported by people in the Cathedral away from the Cathedral and occasions in which Cathedral people participated in formal inter faith forums/events and ecumenical events.
Visitors	Visitors are defined as either people paying or donating at the point of entry or those who do not pay but possibly donate at alms box (excluding those who attend services and events.) Canterbury, London, York and Westminster Abbey fall within the most popular and important cathedrals as published under the "Association of Leading Visitor Attractions" (ALVA). Visitor numbers for these cathedrals and royal peculiar have been taken from ALVA's website. From 2012, York Minster no longer falls within this category.







At Westminster Abbey - 7,000 adults, children and young people attended Christmas Day/Eve services and more than 18,800 attended over the Advent season. The largest congregation size recorded during that season was 2,000 people.

In 2014 there were 760 baptisms and 18 thanksgivings conducted in cathedrals. The number of baptisms of people over 1 year of age has increased considerably since the year 2004, rising from 340 baptisms in 2004 to 450 in 2014. Since 2012, infant baptisms have been falling steadily. Overall, these figures reflect the national trend.



The number of marriages conducted in cathedrals was generally stable between 2004 and 2014. The number of blessings for newly married couples has been generally declining during the last decade.

The number of funerals conducted by cathedrals has remained reasonably stable over the last ten years.



The number of children and young people attending educational events at cathedrals increased by 13.9% over the period 2004 to 2014. Over half of these visits were children under 11 years old (Nursery/Pre-prep and Primary/Prep). Educational visits at Westminster Abbey were 13,400 in 2014. In 2013, however, the number of educational visits was the highest recorded at 321,700 falling to 309,400 (the second highest recording) in 2014.

# Figure 6: Children and young people attending schools associated with Church of England cathedrals (Excluding Royal Peculiars) 2004 - 2014





Figure 5: Children and young people attending educational events at Church of England cathedrals (excluding Royal Peculiars) 2004 to 2014

Over 1.1 million people attended 6,230 public/civic events held in cathedrals. 2,770 specially arranged services were conducted by cathedrals in 2014 and these attracted 919,100 people.

Cathedrals continue to enjoy partnerships with a number of universities and colleges by hosting award ceremonies throughout the year. It is an important part of maintaining valued and long-held relationships with these higher-educational establishments. Also, these events strengthen ties with the community and generate revenue. Schools continue to visit cathedrals to mark special commemorative dates in their calendar year. The number of specially arranged school services rose from 90 in 2010 to 520 in 2014.

In 2014, there were over 2,110 occasions in which Cathedral clergy/people participated in diocesan meetings/events; 1,650 events/services supported by clergy away from the cathedral; approximately 300 events/services supported by the Cathedral choir away from the cathedral; 280 occasions in which cathedral people participated in formal inter faith forums and events and 490 occasions of participation in ecumenical events.




Figure 7: Activities of Cathedral people at Church of England excluding Royal Peculiars 2014

NB: It should be noted that the response rate to activities outside the cathedral varied between cathedrals and not all cathedrals responded.

Over the last ten years the number of volunteers involved in the mission and ministry of cathedrals has increased from 12,400 in 2004 to 15,200 in 2014. Cathedrals could not operate at the level of excellence or activity that it does without them.

Cathedrals promote spiritual openness, inclusivity and diversity in membership and outreach. Including Westminster Abbey, the total number of visitors to cathedrals in 2014 was over 10 million.



At the centre of the life of the cathedral is the daily offering of worship and praise. Almost 2,000 child and adult choristers were involved in providing traditional choral music in 2014 and an additional 2,000 children and adults were involved in voluntary choirs.



1,450 child choristers and 470 paid professional adults provided traditional choral music in 2014. In addition, 540 children and 1,420 adults were involved in voluntary choirs. Cathedrals have continued to welcome visiting choirs and orchestras from around the world. In 2014, there were 40 male, 30 female, 70 mixed choirs and 820 visiting choirs reported.

Cathedrals are now a very popular venue for concerts. There were over 1,000 regular musicians involved in services:- 300 boys, 280 girls, 310 men and 120 women. There were an additional 580 occasional musicians:- 60 boys, 50 girls, 250 men and 220 women.
