


Summary Findings

Objectives

The key aims of this research were to:

- Understand broad perceptions of Jesus among 11-18 year olds.
- Understand how frequently Christians and non-Christians have conversations about faith in Jesus.
- Explore how Christians feel about talking to non-Christians about their faith in Jesus.
- Explore how non-Christians feel when Christians talk to them about their faith in Jesus.
- Understand the reasons why young people become Christians.



Sample

ComRes surveyed 2000 11-18 year olds in England online.

Christians: 831

Non-Christians: 1169

Interpretation

Data have been weighted by age, gender and region to be representative of all 11-18 year olds in England.



Findings marked with an asterisk (*) indicate a low base size.

These results should be treated with caution.



Who is in the team?



'Practising Christians' are defined as those who identify as Christian, say they attend Church at least once a month, pray at least once a week and read / listen the Bible at least once a week.

'Church' was not defined in the original question and so may include church services undertaken in schools, as well as informal services interpreted by young people as 'going to church'.

13% of all 11-18 year olds are practicing Christians with 21% of all 11-18 year olds self identifying as active followers of Jesus

Almost unbelievable!




42% of English young people say Jesus was a real person but not God







45% of all young people do not know an active Christian

55% of young people in England say that they personally know an active Christian – someone who follows Jesus, with two in five (38%) saying they do not. Just fewer than one in ten (7%) say they don't know.






Christians are well thought of, most popularly being described as friendly, caring, fun and generous.






Similar proportions of adults and young people feel sad they do not share our faith


Of the 57% of English non-Christian <u>adults</u> who had a conversation with a christian about their faith:

At least 1 in 6 young people wanted to know more about Jesus or were interested in a spiritual experience





12% of young practising Christians do not feel comfortable talking about faith













1 in 4 young people admit they are afraid of causing offence all or most of the time

When asked which two or three reasons were most important in bringing practicing young people to faith, family was the biggest influencer




