Foreword

Introduction

Church Statistics 2007/8 continues to provide results from attendance and other affiliation measures collected by Church of England parishes and cathedrals since the turn of the millennium. These measures are designed to reflect modern day lifestyles and must be interpreted against the background of a growing number of government and other independent national surveys. National surveys continue to endorse the 2001 government census results that indicate a continuing majority of the English population to be Christian. In summary, 72% of the population of England indicated their religious affiliation to be Christian, 6% of other faiths, 14% of no religion and 8% did not state their religion.

In a pluralistic society, Christian denominations continue to play a significant role in the life of the nation. Approaching half of the adult population regards itself as Anglican (Opinion Research Business national poll 2007). Church Statistics 2007/8 provides more detailed geographical evidence of the continued involvement of the Church of England in the everyday lives of men, women and children at the beginning of the twenty-first century. This builds on similar information first published in Church Statistics 2002 and continues to be facilitated by the successful completion of the digitisation of the parish boundaries sponsored jointly by the Church of England dioceses and the Church Commissioners.

New attendance statistics

Following a major review of annual statistical information collection from parishes. new attendance measures were designed with dioceses during the summer of 2000. These are generally based on a four week count by parishes of their attendance levels at church worship in October. There is no single period in the year when church attendance could be said to be 'normal' or even 'average' but October is accepted across the Church of England and by our ecumenical partners as the easiest and most comparable month in which to carry out this quantitative exercise.

It would be wrong to make direct comparisons between the number counted in church services across October and the figures that churches have traditionally estimated as their "usual Sunday attendance". Examination of the attendance levels collated in this publication in 'All age church attendance 2000 to 2007' and 'Church attendance 2000 to 2007.' reveal a larger church and fairly static levels of church attendance. On average 1.2 million people attended church-based services of worship each week in 2007, slightly under one million of these on Sundays. Numbers fluctuated week by week, among adults on average doubling at points across the month while almost quadrupling among children and young people. Across a typical month in the year parish church and cathedral worship attracted 1.7 million people but only 1.4 million of these attended on Sundays. The Church is indeed a seven days a week Church, and in 2007 a third, i.e. 13 dioceses, saw increases over two years in their all age church attendance levels as shown in the map 'All age church attendance 2007'.

'Research towards fresh expressions of church' reveals that annual parochial church attendance statistics frequently do not include new forms of church or fresh expressions of church. One in three parishes are involved in fresh expressions of church among people who only occasionally otherwise attend church. Such fresh expressions involve significant numbers of adults, children and young people as explored further in the accompanying paper Research towards Fresh Expressions of Church which can be found at

Easter and Christmas are festivals in the Christian year when traditionally many attend special occasions of worship in our parish churches and cathedrals. Churches and cathedrals were asked to estimate attendance levels at these festivals for the first time in 2000. The results continue to challenge, and in the case of cathedrals reflected steadily increasing numbers throughout the year. On Christmas Day/Eve 2007 2.7 million people attended church and cathedral worship, while 1.5 million attended on Easter Day. The importance of these Christian festivals in people's lives is evident in that Christmas services attracted over twice the average weekly attendance of our parish churches and cathedrals. Figures collected in previous years were directly comparable.

Occasional offices

The church has traditionally monitored electoral roll and baptism levels, but from 2000 parishes and cathedrals has been asked to estimate the number of occasions where people received direct pastoral contact through each of the occasional offices. Marriages can be performed in recognized places other than churches and cathedrals. The tables 'Total marriages in England' and 'First marriages, England and Wales' (based on local authority registrars' returns) indicate that just under a quarter of marriages were performed by Church of England ministers, Local churches had significant opportunities for mission and ministry through over 400,000 occasional offices performed by their ministers in 2007. Funerals account for approaching half of these which is a significant pastoral load for many clergy. The table 'Parochial marriages and funerals 2007' shows that 42% of deaths in England are marked with Church of England funerals. Baptisms and thanksgivings represented over a third of the occasional offices, marriages and blessings of civil marriages about one in seven. At these essentially family and community events, local churches have unique opportunities for contact among a wide constituency and national public attitude surveys show this to be valued by the Christian public.

Licensed ministers

All God's people are called to exercise their ministry in his world and in his Church. The statistics of this report relate to ministries which are nationally licensed. The total number of stipendiary clergy available for diocesan appointments continues to decline. Since the turn of the millennium there has been a net loss of 12%. This is projected to continue at a similar level with the net loss over the period 2008 to 2013 approaching 600 from a current total of 8,370. (These figures include clergy with full-time appointments and those with part-time appointments aggregated to their full-time equivalents. Europe, due to the special nature of its chaplaincies, is excluded.) These projections take into account the expected number of ordinations to stipendiary ministry. This figure stood at 321 in 2008. It is estimated to remain static at 322 in 2009 and then rise to 334 in 2010. For the years 2011 to 2013 a moving average of the previous five years ordination figures has been used. The number of people entering stipendiary ministry is not sufficient to replace those who are retiring. Detailed figures on the age structure are contained in 'Clergy age profiles and age structure' tables.

Among those licensed as unpaid ministers attached to parishes, the number of non-stipendiary ministers continued to increase to 2,712 in 2008. In addition, almost half the diocese utilise ordained local ministers. The numbers stood at 576 in 2008 compared to 311 in 2000, with a high of 610 in 2007; thus there was a 96% increase in ordained local ministers between 2000 and 2007. Dioceses benefit from a growing number of lay ministers. However across the country the number of licensed readers has decreased by almost 12% over the same period. In 2008 there were 7,653 licensed readers, fewer than the 8,057 in 2005 and 8,694 in 2000 (excluding readers with permission to officiate and active emeriti).

The number of women clergy, stipendiary and non-stipendiary, continues to rise. In 2008 there were 1,596 women in full-time stipendiary diocesan appointments compared with 1,466 in 2005 and 1,140 in 2000, generating a rise of over a third (40%) (these figures include the Diocese in Europe). Women make up about one in five (19%) of stipendiary parochial clergy. Out of every seven incumbents one is a woman (15%). The equivalent figure for clergy of incumbent status is more than one in three clergy (36%). Of a total of 359 dignitaries in 2007, 31 were women, eight more than 2005 and nineteen more than 2000. Women in non-stipendiary ministry in 2008 made up approaching a half (49%) of the total, and in ordained local ministry just over one half of the total (54%). For licensed readers the equivalent proportion 49%.

The Church also benefits from the ministry of 232 Church Army evangelists, of whom 28 are ordained; 401 professed members of religious communities, of whom 99 are ordained, and 1,213 chaplains working with mission agencies, the armed services, in hospitals, prisons, schools, higher and further education. In each of these categories of ministry there are fewer people than in 2000. At the turn of the millennium there were 257 Church Army evangelists, 729 professed members of

religious communities and 1,258 chaplains. A further 269 non-stipendiary clergy minister within dioceses but outside the formal parochial system.

Since 1994 when all categories of licensed ministry were opened to men and women, the total number of those entering licensed ministry in the Church of England (clergy ordinations and reader admissions combined) has remained at similar levels, falling only slightly, (by 5%) from 1038 to 949 in 2008. Over the same period, the total number of ordinations has risen by 42% from 405 in 1994 to 574 in 2008 while the number of reader admissions correspondingly decreased by 41% from 633 in 1994 to 375 in 2008. In particular, the number of people ordained to stipendiary ministry increased slightly from 316 in 1994 to 321 in 2008 compared with approaching a three-fold increase in non-stipendiary ordinations (89 in 1994 to 253 in 2008). In addition, it is worth noting that just over half (56%) of those ordained in 2008 entered stipendiary ministry compared to 48% in 2007 and over three quarters (78%) in 1994.

The average age of full-time stipendiary diocesan clergy is 51 years and one in five (22%) of full-time stipendiary diocesan clergy are aged 60 and over. Two-thirds (66%) are aged between 40 and 59 years, and 12% under 40. The average age of non-stipendiary diocesan clergy is 58 years while half (50%) of non-stipendiary ministers (including OLM's) and 51% licensed readers are aged 60 and over. The majority of the remaining half are in the 40 to 59 age group leaving just 4% of non-stipendiary ministers and less than 3% of readers under 40.

The total number of recommendations for training for ministry was 490 in 2008, 105 less than in 2007. The numbers of men and women recommended in 2008 were 273 and 217 respectively. Within these figures, the number recommended for ordained local ministry was 18 (10 men and 8 women), a decrease of 31 from the previous year.

Overall, there continued to be a greater number of candidates in training on theological courses (688) at the end of 2008 than were at theological colleges (639). Since the turn of the millennium the number on training courses has continued an upward trend - with an increase of 16% - and the number attending colleges has increased by 3%. Over the same time period the overall number in training for ordination (1,422 in 2000 then dropping to 1,308 in 2004) has now increased to 1411 with greatest number of candidates recommended for training being in the age range 40 to 49 years. Since 2000 the proportion of candidates recommended for training under 30 years of age has increased slightly at approximately 17%. The number of readers in training has fallen by over a quarter (28%) since 2000 from 1,315 to 953 in 2008.

Financial giving

During 2007 parish incomes rose significantly to £898 million, increasing by 8.5% compared with 2006, the largest rate of increase for ten years. Giving and donations from living donors exceeded half a billion pounds for the first time in 2007. When combined with a further £51 million of fundraising, and £45 million from legacies, total income from individuals exceeds £600 million, over two thirds of the income of parishes.

The core of parish incomes is regular, planned giving. In 2007, parishes received over £280 million from 634,000 giving 'units' (some units will represent a couple.) at an average of £8.56 per week. Most of these givers are able to give through Gift Aid, and a total of £79 million was reclaimed by parishes from HMRC. On average, before the recovery of tax, 513,000 tax-efficient givers gave £9.28 per week. The trends in giving by churchgoers are shown in accompanying tables and charts, and it is encouraging to note that this continues to rise above the level of inflation.

Income received by parishes in 2007 from legacies is a very slight increase on 2006's record levels. There is a slight decrease in the number of legacies received, but this may well be due to a change in the data collection questionnaire, which now asks for each legacy to be recorded only once, even if income is received in more than one financial year.

Income from dividends, interest and property rose by 13% to over £50 million. Whilst 2008 investment income may match this, this is expected to decline in the following years due to lower interest rates and stockmarket returns.

Outward giving from PCCs to mission organizations and other charities exceeded £50 million. The extent of this wider support for the Church's mission is not widely perceived, yet in total, this exceeds the BBC's 'Children in Need' appeal.

For the first time, the survey of parish finance separated out the level of Utility Bills paid by PCCs, and this exceeds £31 million.

Total capital expenditure rose by 5.5% at £184 million. Over a third of this, £64 million, is investment in new buildings and extensions.

Summary

Today people support their local churches, chapels and cathedrals in many different ways. A national opinion survey in October 2007 by Opinion Research Business revealed that 85% of adults had visited a local church or chapel in the previous year for a wide range of activities alongside attendance at church worship. While the quantitative information is not fully comprehensive, it does provide a healthy picture of the variety of local church life. Church attendance patterns, the role of the occasional offices, the increased diversity of ordained and lay ministries, financial giving and other measures of church support are all continuing to evolve at the turn of the millennium in ways which are beginning to capture the interest of many serious religious commentators.

We are particularly grateful to the dioceses and the parishes for continuing to embrace new aspects of the annual parochial return exercise. Their co-operation continues to remain crucial to the successful gathering of the information required for this publication, and we are encouraged that they too are finding the results useful for their own forward planning. This edition includes as much appropriate information as possible from the Diocese in Europe and from diocesan cathedrals. Definitions

In the tables relating to **attendance at church services** new measures of church attendance are employed:

Average Sunday attendance

= the average number of attenders at Sunday church services typically over a four week period in October.

Average weekly attendance

the average number of attenders at church services throughout the week typically over a four week period in October.

Each of the above measures are provided separately for adults and children/young people aged under 16 years. The highest and lowest counts over the four week period are calculated as follows:

Highest Sunday/weekly attendance

= the sum of the highest Sunday (weekly) attendances over the four week period.

Lowest Sunday/weekly attendance

= the sum of the lowest Sunday (weekly) attendances over the four week period.

Attendance figures have only been included where local churches held at least one church based service (which included adult presence) during the week under examination.

In the tables relating to **licensed ministers**: Stipendiary clergy and lay workers are paid by the central Church payroll.

Non-stipendiary clergy (and Ordained Local Ministers) hold diocesan licenses with a role in the parishes.

Other non-stipendiary clergy hold other roles in the Church that are not parish based. More detail is provided in note 5, of the table Chaplaincy and other ministries 2008.

Details of chaplains and other ministers working outside the parish framework can also be found in table Chaplaincy and other ministries 2008.

In the tables relating to **finance**, components of income and expenditure are defined as follows:

Income

Tax-efficient planned giving

= tax-efficient planned giving including

regular Gift Aid donations.

Total direct giving

= planned giving plus church collections

and boxes.

Other voluntary income = all other voluntary income for ordinary expenditure excluding income tax, e.g. fund-raising events, net profit

on magazine/bookstall, sundry donations.

Total voluntary income = direct giving plus income tax plus other voluntary income.

Other recurring income= dividends and interest, recurring diocesan and other

grants, and all other income for expenditure on ordinary purposes of the PCC, net surplus from church hall or other buildings, income from endowments or trust funds if

used for ordinary purposes.

Total recurring income= total voluntary income plus other recurring income.

Expenditure

Total recurring expenditure = the total of ALL expenditure (including charitable giving) for the ordinary purposes of the PCC i.e.

excluding only non-recurring items of capital expenditure

and non-revenue items.

Notes

- 1. While many figures in this booklet have been rounded, totals, percentages and averages were calculated before rounding. Hence row and column totals will not always agree exactly with the sum of the stated amounts.
- 2. Membership, attendance and finance figures reported in this booklet have been collated from the annual parochial returns completed each year by parishes on behalf of Parochial Church Councils.
- 3. Among the 13,000 parishes of the Church of England there are around 600 Local Ecumenical Partnerships in roughly half of which there is a congregation and a ministry shared between the Church of England and certain other churches. In such circumstances it is not always possible (or indeed desirable) to isolate the Anglican component of the congregation. The parochial statistics will therefore include a small element which may appear also in the statistics of other churches.
- 4. Figures for cathedrals and the Diocese in Europe are included as far as possible. Their inclusion is most frequently inappropriate in the finance tables. Rises in the financial figures for the Diocese in Europe are largely accounted for by the devaluation of Sterling.
- 5. The figures for *stipendiary clergy* (which include those outside the clergy share system) and for lay workers are based on statistics derived from the central Church payroll.
- Details of chaplains and other ministers working outside the parish framework, and of non-stipendiary clergy, are based on statistics derived from the database used to compile Crockford's Clerical Directory. Where possible they have been cross-referenced with material produced by organising bodies.
- 7. Unrestricted income is income that may be used by the PCC for general church expenses. Restricted income is income which may not be used for any purpose other than as specified by the donor. (Income which a PCC designates for a specified purpose is considered to be unrestricted, since the PCC and not the donor is determining how it is to be used.)
- Recurring income includes direct giving, other voluntary income and any other recurring income. One-off income includes insurance claims, non-recurring grants, legacies, special appeals and the sale of fixed assets.
- Recurring expenditure includes donations to charities, parish share/quota, clergy expenses, church running costs, costs relating to trading, salaries and support costs. Capital expenditure includes major repairs, redecoration and new building work.









Baptisms comparisons












Parochial occasional offices Five years comparison 2002-2007




New statistics gathered on the occasional offices reveal that on average each (stipendiary) parochial cleric undertakes one occasional office every week and this is almost equally split between funerals and the remaining occasional offices. Almost 389,400 occasional offices were taken during the year 2007 by parish and cathedral ministers. Approximately half were funerals, over a third were baptisms or services of thanksgiving while about one in seven were marriages or blessings of civil marriage.

Between 2002 and 2007, there was a 12% drop in the number of occasional offices undertaken by parish and cathedral ministers which appears to be equally spread across the different offices.

In 2007, Church of England parochial funerals were conducted for 42% of all deaths in England. In addition to parochial funerals, funerals were also conducted by Church of England clergy outside the parochial system, for example by chaplains or by retired clergy without reference to the local parish.

The figures for stipendiary clergy (full-time, part-time and including those outside the clergy share system) and for lay workers above are based on statistics derived from the central Church payroll. Details of chaplains and other ministers working outside the parish framework, and of non-stipendiary clergy, are based on statistics derived from the database used to compile *Crockford's Clerical Directory*. Where possible, they have been cross-referenced with material produced by organizing bodies (Church Army, the Home Office for prison chaplains, and the Hospital Chaplaincies Council for hospital chaplains).

The figure shown for active retired ordained clergy is an estimate of the number of licensed retired clergy who take an active part in ministry. It is based on the number of retired clergy known to have either permission to officiate, licence to officiate or actual appointments. Pension Board records indicate a total of 9117 retired stipendiary clergy.



Notes

- 1. The table does not include chaplains and other clergy counted elsewhere in the statistics; for example chaplains who have a diocesan appointment and are on the Church Commissioners' payroll.
- Where an individual holds more than one appointment it has been a subjective decision as to where to place an individual. This means that there is inevitably some disparity between the above figures and those for previous years.
- Apart from chaplains, ordained members of the teaching staffs of schools and colleges are not counted here, but are included within the non-stipendiary figures.
- 'Other chaptains' includes full and part-time ordained staff of retreat houses, conference and healing centres, shrines, almshouses, missionary societies and communities.
- 'Other non-stipendiary clergy' includes: full and part-time ordained staff with either diocesan or non-diocesan appointments; some cathedral clergy; certain chaplains; and those who are not parish deployable but with licence to officiate or permission to officiate.
- Of these, 94 are professed in vows and 5 are novices or associates. There are an additional 401 lay members of religious communities who are professed in vows (38 men and 363 women).
- In addition there are 140 accredited lay workers on the Church Commissioners' payroll (including some church army evangelists), 10 deaconesses, and a further 12 full-time clergy on the staff of Church House and Lambeth Palace.

The figures for chaplains and other ministers working outside the parish framework are based on statistics derived from the database used to compile *Crockford's Clerical Directory* (with the exception of religious communities and Church Army where data is collected from source). Where possible, they have been cross-referenced with material produced by organizing bodies (Ministry of Defence for the forces chaplains; Home Office for prison chaplains; Hospital Chaplaincies Council for hospital chaplains).





Ten year comparisons 1998-2008 Licensed Readers by Gender



Licensed Readers at December 2008




Readers in training at December 2008

1998 actual, 2008 actual and 2018 as projected in 2009




Age structure of full-time clergy as at 31 December 2008







Age profile of licensed ministers 2008












Gender of diocesan clergy 2008 & 1994 2008

Full-time stipendiary clergy losses and gains 1990-2008

The following tables are based on the numbers of clergy leaving and entering the clergy payroll (excluding the Diocese in Europe), which is held currently by the Church Commissioners. The losses and gains recorded include people that have moved to and from the Diocese in Europe. to and from posts which are funded by external agencies such as National Health Service Trusts, the Prison Service, mission agencies or schools, and between stipendiary and selfsupporting ministry or full-time and part-time.

The total number of full-time stipendiary clergy at the end of 2008 was 8,215 (6,632 men plus 1.583 women). The number of full-time stipendiary clergy plus the whole-time equivalent of part-time stipendiary clergy within the Clergy Apportionment process was 8,369, which is slightly lower than the 8,406 projected at the start of 2008.

The stipendiary clergy share system

A single clergy diocesan deployment formula was introduced in 1995 and continues to be approved by the House of Bishops. Its intention is to ensure that stipendiary clergy are distributed equitably amongst dioceses according to need. The diocese in Europe is not included because of the special nature of its chaplaincies.

The apportionment involves four factors for each diocese and uses the latest available statistics, weighted as shown in brackets:

Population (8) to reflect the number of persons for whom a pastoral responsibility is assumed;

Area (1) to reflect the larger distances covered in rural dioceses;

Membership (3) to reflect the number of Church members to be cared for. It is measured by: one-third Electoral Roll members plus two-thirds Average Weekly Attendance, adults, children and young people; 1

Number of (3) to reflect the number of services that need to be provided in different churches.

All clergy in parochial or diocesan posts count towards the allocation unless their responsibilities are national, provincial or cover more than one diocese.

The share calculation takes part-time stipendiary clergy into account. There were 8,215 full-time stipendiary clergy as at 31 December 2008 and 311 part-time stipendiary clergy. The whole-time equivalent of the part-time clergy was calculated to be 154, thus giving a total deployable stipendiary workforce of 8,369. The distribution of stipendiary clergy across the dioceses as at 31 December 2008 and the diocesan share allocations are shown in the table opposite.

Projections of stipendiary clergy numbers

The table below shows the end of year projections for the number of stipendiary clergy estimated to be working in the diocesan framework from 2009 to 2013. Projections are intended to show the results of letting present trends continue, rather than as explicit predictions of the future. They are calculated by considering past clergy losses and gains, together with the number of ordinations to stipendiary ministry anticipated for 2009 and 2010, and applying them to the actual numbers of stipendiary clergy in post on 31st December 2008. After comparing the actual outturns with earlier projections for the same year, the mechanism is reviewed to reduce sources of inaccuracy.


Estimates of retirement patterns take the age profile of present clergy into account and consider what proportion of clergy of similar age have retired in recent years. Because of a high proportion of clergy born shortly after 1945, retirements are expected to rise until 2013 and remain high thereafter. The annual losses in clergy numbers due to deaths in service and resignations are likely to decrease because they are dependent on the decreasing number of clergy at the start of the year.

Ordination numbers are estimated several years ahead in consultation with the theological institutions and dioceses and there will be factors influencing these figures that cannot be anticipated at this stage. The most recent information available anticipates 322 ordinations in 2009 and 334 in 2010. These figures represent a step up from recent years. From 2011, a moving average of stipendiary ordination figures

starting from three past years and two anticipated years has been used. This gives an estimate above any actual number from the recent past. The projections here assume that these higher anticipated numbers do indeed enter stipendiary ministry.

The greatest uncertainty comes from movements into and out of stipendiary ministry aside from ordination, death and retirement. Some resign and leave completely. For others, there is two-way exchange with self-supporting ministry, chaplaincy, other provinces and the Diocese in Europe. Other clergy are remaining stipendiary but for altered hours. These projections apply a combined moving average of all such movements to future years. As transfers to self-supporting ministry and part-time working become increasingly prevalent, it may be that the projection mechanism will need to be refined to deal specifically with them.

Projections of stipendiary clergy numbers



The average age of ordinands to stipendiary ministry has risen since 1999 from 40 to 43 for women and from 35 to 38 for men. These projections assume that the ages will not rise any further, but the situation is continually reviewed.

If present trends continue, there will be fewer clergy in stipendiary ministry in future years. The planned higher levels of ordinations may keep pace with retirements, but other losses far exceed other gains. In contrast, the number of non-stipendiary clergy continues to increase, gaining both new ordinations and former stipendiary clergy.


The supply and demand of stipendiary clergy is monitored annually by the House of Bishops.

2008 admissions and Ordinations





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Ordinations 1994 to 2008


Proportion of ordinations by gender 1998, 2003 and 2008








Growth in income and expenditure




In the nine year span between 1998 and 2007 recurring income increased by 62% compared with a rise in the Retail Prices Index of 27%.

Over the same period recurring expenditure increased by 58%, one-off income increased by 57%, and capital expenditure increased by 79%.






