TESTIMONY

Paul Davey: Farmer from Lincoln on farming to give the soil life

Hello, my name's Paul Davey, I'm a seventh-generation farmer from Lincolnshire. We farm in the Lincolnshire Wolds with a flock of sheep, we have a growing a number of different crops, milling wheat through to yellow linseed. The sort of thing that you might find in a multi-seeded batch loaf. Each year we get the opportunity for the farm to almost have a rebirth, to reinvent the way we farm, and change and embrace those changes be they adapting to the weather, or be they looking at alternative cropping, and alternative farming systems.

2019 through to 2020 is not only a time of great change for our industry, with our changing relationship with the European Union, but also it's also been a year of great extremes with the weather.

This year we have the smallest area of winter wheat in the United Kingdom for a generation, and possibly the smallest harvest for a generation as well.

The soils we work with are our greatest resource, we take the time to preserve those as best we can, with modern thinking. We pray that as farmers we continue to look for the most sustainable answers to help with feeding the planet and the support that our communities, friends, our customers are able to give us in the future.

TESTIMONY

Shayne Tyler, Justice in produce supply chain and Clewer Slavery App

Hello, my name's Shayne Tyler and I'm the group compliance director for the Fresca Group. We own a number of businesses around the UK, and supply fruit and veg to the retail accounts. Today I'm standing in the fields of one of our businesses, DGM Growers, who are a proud business based in Saracen's Head, in South Lincolnshire, and we're in the rural Lincolnshire flats now. There's been the number of challenges over the years, but 2019 and 2020 have proven to be quite difficult. With Brexit impending, and potential labour shortages, but also what we're facing with COVID-19. There's a lot of vulnerable people currently in our industry, in communities, and it's what we're trying to do to help them, and make sure that they're best placed in our industry.

Farm labour in our industry is typically an industry which is extremely variable in the amount of work, availability of work. It's truly seasonal, and that doesn't suit everybody. So we tend to have quite sporadic labour shortages, or over labour, which creates vulnerabilities for workers in our supply chain. And we need to have a sustainable supply chain that can help facilitate those people within it. Because we have vulnerable people we need to start looking out a little bit more for the people around us, not just in the fields, but in all areas of rural community. If we just took a moment to care for the person that's next to us on the train, next to us in a shop, and just looking out to ensure that we're doing whatever we can to make sure that their welfare is being catered for, then that's something that we can go all do. It's certainly something that I now try and do as much as I can.

Earlier this year we worked with the Clewer Initiative, the National Crime Agency, and the Gangmasters and the Labour Abuse Authority to recognise that there are some people in our industry that are vulnerable, and we developed an app called the 'Farm Work Welfare App', it's something that you can download, it's something that you can use, that will help you understand what farm work life is like, what the rights of workers are, and should there be anything that gives anybody any concerns you can report a concern that will then be dealt with by the authorities, totally confidentially, that could help the welfare of a fellow human.

For me there's many things that we could do to help those that are vulnerable in our society, one thing that we could pray for, is for those authorities that are helping tackle those that are taking it upon their lives to exploit these people. Businesses like ours don't exploit people, but we have to deal with those that choose to do so, and I'd very much appreciate if we could pray to help the authorities tackle that.

Simon Park, Managing Director of Kidd's Transport

Hi, I'm Simon Park, I'm the Managing Director of Kidd's Transport, which is a logistics company based in Lancaster. The haulage industry as a whole is used to challenges, we're quite good at it, we get challenges all the time, we meet them head on day after day. 95 to 98 percent of all products of everything we have in this country has been delivered by truck, that's including your house, that's including the street outside your house, the pipeline, the utilities to that house. We're used to challenges. The biggest two challenges at the moment are obviously Brexit and COVID, and they've delivered the biggest challenge which is the uncertainty that this country is going through at the moment. People aren't certain what's going to happen in the future, they're not spending as much, businesses aren't going for it like we would hope them to do so, so at the moment the uncertainty is one of the biggest challenge we have in the industry at the moment.

We tend to try and develop our staff, help our staff grow beyond working for us, to achieve their goals, whether they want to become solicitors, whether they want to become doctors, whatever they want to do. We try and push them on to that, that way if we can. Improve their education, improve, not just their finances, but we want them to thrive. We don't want our staff to just survive and to just make do. That includes forklift staff, we've had all sorts of weird and wonderful people come through there, and some people have gone on to achieve great things within the warehouse, which is what we like to see. So I would like to see us in a position where we can support that and continue that, and to have the time and the skills and the lack of pressure to deliver that kind of thing for our staff.

As an industry as a whole, I think just to pray against this uncertainty that we have, the reading in Luke is very apt at the moment, we don't need to worry, we can just trust God, but uncertainty does bring that kind of worry, ironically.

Supermarket workers on challenges of this time: Rev Bill Durose, Supermarket worker and SSM in Stoke-on-Trent and Sharon Evans Supermarket worker from Wollescote in the West Midlands

Hi, My name is Bill Durose, an SSM, the Stoke-On-Trent Team; I work for Sainsburys! The best thing about my job is that I'm based in a supermarket, which is the centre of the community, about forty-five thousand people a week come through our doors, I am there right in the middle of it, doing God's work. During this pandemic, it's been tough in the supermarket industry, with things like social distancing, at the beginning, starting again now with panic buying. It's put a lot of strain on everyone. Because of the self-isolating we miss seeing a lot of our very elderly customers, who quite often did not see anyone else, unless they visited Sainsbury's. They became part of our family. Colleagues were obviously concerned for their safety, and asking other customers for news of their friends. Mostly it was good news, but sometimes colleagues would ask for prayers for someone who was really, really ill. Another impact I've been at, is that I've been in more demand than ever for prayers and to conduct funerals. Trying to explain where God is in this pandemic to people who've just lost a loved one can be difficult.

But I'm still humbled when someone comes to me and says their loved ones has asked 'that Vicar' from Sainsbury's to do their funeral. One particular funeral I conducted of a very well-liked customer, upset some of the cashiers, because they could not go to the service to say goodbye. Sometimes people forget that we are not just someone who works in a supermarket, but people who really care about our forty-five thousand friends.

We would ask all to pray for everyone in the retail sector, who are on their own frontline, who are often forgotten about during this time. Ask God for their safety and patience, that they can go home safely each day to their loved ones. Amen.

Hello, I'm Sharon and I've worked for Sainsbury's for over fifteen years, I started Sainsbury's when my children were little to fit round their school times and their bedtimes, I love working with the team that I'm working with, I feel that we work well, and we look out for one another, and I feel that I make a difference, and I can come in and I know what I'm doing, and I can be part of making it a success.

As staff we work really hard to get things on the shelf as soon as possible, as soon as it comes in, so that people are able to get what they need, and then there's the concern of working in an environment where we're exposed to the virus, so if you're a single parent, or you've got caring responsibilities, or people at home, vulnerable, it is a worry in case you take it back, and the worry of childcare, so if a child has to isolate at home then you have to take time off work, so if you could pray for that, that would be great. And we miss seeing our regular customers, who are hopefully at home shielding, so prayers would be really beneficial for our mental health, and our physical health. As you go round the store you could pray, or if you're passing in the car, just being nice to staff, being kind and saying thank you makes a big difference.

We've had customers say thank you for what you're doing, and that's really brightened our day. Send a card to the store, to our managers, or to staff, saying thank you, and that you're thinking of us. We work really hard to provide a good service, during a very difficult time. If you could pray for protection for us, for our families, for peace, and protection and a smooth service, especially over Christmas when people are stressed and trying to get all their Christmas shopping done. If you could pray that we can provide a good service and that people come in and find peace. Protection for our vulnerable customers too, who need to shop and that are probably coming out of isolation now, that people won't panic buy, for kindness and respect, that we can deliver as smooth a service as possible. Pray a blessing when you are in store, pray a blessing for staff, and for customers, or if you're in the car passing pray a blessing for the stores that you pass. That would make a huge difference. Thank you.
