INTRODUCTION

Rev Sarah Schofield introduces the service

I am Sarah Schofield, Lead Chaplain for the University of Wolverhampton's Multifaith Chaplaincy and a priest in the Church of England's Diocese of Lichfield. Along with Muslim, Sikh and Christian colleagues I minister within a diverse academic community of over 25000 people. Over the past year the university has nurtured online community from Fresher Week film nights to PhD vivas. Chaplaincy has been no exception with prayer, pastoral care and shared learning have all moved online.

Now, as our 4 campuses are gradually opening up we will take much of what we have learnt into our return to campus. Moving online has broadened the range of students we support. We have realised that our old model, requiring students to come to us has much to gain from the best of our online experiences. Our building offers a place to find and create community, lockdown has shown us the internet can as well.

When on campus we do not host regular Sunday services, instead we encourage students to make and sustain relationships with local churches. The witness of Christian students and staff within the university and friendly churches are vital to university chaplaincy. This service is led by a mixture of students, staff and representatives of churches close to our Walsall and Wolverhampton campuses.

The reader says

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles. (Ch. 8: 26-40)

Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Get up and go towards the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.' So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth.'

The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?' Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?' He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.
