HOW TO USE THIS BOOKLET

There are 40 actions, one for each of the forty days of Lent, plus one for Easter Day. For each week (starting on Sundays from Week 1 onwards) there is:

- A theme, to help us think about how we can live together well
- A short passage from the Bible
- A simple prayer for use throughout the week.

For each day (Monday to Saturday) there is a challenge. On some days there are suggested practical actions you and your family or your class at school could take to help others. On others there are challenges to read or watch Bible stories, reflect, pray and learn more about the theme of justice.

How many challenges can you do?

There is also an accompanying booklet for grown-ups which also includes daily reflections, as well as a free app.
