Summary

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to have an impact on the worshipping life of the Church of England in 2021. Its effects were less severe in 2021 than in 2020.

The Church of England's all age average weekly attendance, which includes Sunday and midweek attendance, was 854,000 people in 2019; 345,000 people in 2020; and 605,000 people in 2021.

By most measures, levels of Church of England attendance and participation in 2021 were higher than in 2020 but remained below 2019 levels. An exception is Worshipping Community, which fell by less than many other measures from 2019 to 2020 and which appears to have fallen further from 2020 to 2021.

Many churches continued to offer "Church at Home" services in 2021 – those services offered online, by phone, post, email, and other means. These services provided ways for people who could not attend in person – for reasons including shielding, illness, or general caution about mixing in large numbers – to continue to worship with their church. The proportion of churches offering Church at Home services fell from 71% in October 2020 to 58% in October 2021.

Once again the adaptability of churches' clergy, lay leaders, and congregations has been impressive and encouraging. The uncertainty of the situation in 2021, and the need to make decisions about what to re-start and when to re-start it, what to discontinue, and how to juggle the demands on people's time and energy, have been challenging. It is to the great credit of tens of thousands of people that the Church of England has continued to serve its congregations and communities in such difficult circumstances.

Background

For many people, 2021 was a year of gradual emergence from the COVID-19 pandemic that caused such profound changes to people's lives in 2020. Restrictions on which activities were permitted were eased, and some aspects of life felt "back to normal". However, the COVID-19 pandemic was far from over in 2021 (for example, in mid-October 2021 one in 55 people in England had COVID-19). The pandemic continued to have an impact on the life of the Church of England, with some churches being closed for worship for parts of 2021 and some members of congregations continuing not to attend in-person services.

It would be very surprising, therefore, if Church of England attendance and participation in 2021 returned to their pre-pandemic levels. This report should be treated as a summary of another anomalous year, indicating the extent to which things have "bounced back" but noting that further bouncing back is expected.

National summary

As expected, many measures of church attendance and participation increased from 2020 to 2021, whilst remaining below their 2019 levels (Table 1).

Almost all churches offered in-person worship in October 2021; however, unsurprisingly, attendance was lower than in 2019. Adult average weekly attendance, based on attendance in October, was 28% lower in 2021 than in 2019; child average weekly attendance was 38% lower in 2021 than in 2019.² These figures show the expected substantial increase on 2020 levels.

The total Worshipping Community of regular worshippers was down by 13% compared to 2019, a further fall from its reported 2020 levels. Churches were encouraged to count their regular Church at Home worshippers in their

The fall was only in very small part a result of churches not being open for worship in October 2021: 97% of churches reported some in-person attendance in October 2021, compared to 98% in October 2019 and 86% in October 2020.

Worshipping Community, to avoid excluding those people who were worshipping entirely at Church at Home services, and those who attended a mixture of in-person and Church at Home services. That so many churches offered Church at Home services helps to explain why the fall in Worshipping Community was much smaller than the fall in in-person attendance. The fall from 2020 to 2021 may be because it is now clearer to churches which people have and have not remained part of their Worshipping Communities.

The number of people on church Electoral rolls was down by 2% compared to 2019³, at similar levels to 2020.

Advent and Christmas attendance, and numbers of baptisms and marriages were all, unsurprisingly, higher in 2021 than in 2020, whilst remaining below their 2019 levels.

The number of funerals taken by churches was slightly lower in 2021 than in 2020; the most obvious change from 2020 to 2021 was the shift of funerals back to churches from crematoria/cemeteries.

Comparing 2021 figures with the pre-pandemic situation

A great deal has changed over the course of the COVID-19 pandemic. This section summarises some of the changes for several key measures of attendance and participation. Wherever possible, comparisons are based on those churches that submitted information in both 2019 and 2021.

Worshipping Community

The Worshipping Community of a church is defined as those people who attend worship regularly, once a month or more (whether in-person or "at home").

The total Worshipping Community was 1,113,000 people in 2019; 1,031,000 people in 2020; and 966,000 people in 2021.

The Church of England's Worshipping Community in 2021 was about 1.7% of the population of England.

The reported age distribution of churches' Worshipping Communities has changed a little over the course of the pandemic, with a greater proportion aged over 70 in 2021 than in 2019 (Table 2). It continues to be the case that people aged 70 and over make up a considerably larger proportion of the Church of England's Worshipping Community than of the population of England.

Approximately 10% of the members of churches' Worshipping Communities in 2021 were people who were entirely or predominantly Church at Home worshippers.

Average weekly and average Sunday attendance (October count)

Average weekly and average Sunday attendance figures are based on in-person attendance during October. Figures include attendance at church services and fresh expression of Church. Attendance at services for schools taking place in church is reported separately.

- The total all age average weekly attendance, which includes Sunday and midweek attendance, was 854,000 people in 2019; 345,000 people in 2020; and 605,000 people in 2021.
- 14% of the average weekly attendance was children and young people aged under 16 years old in 2019, and 12% in 2021.
- The total all age average Sunday attendance was 707,000 people in 2019; 298,000 people in 2020; and 509,000 people in 2021.
- 13% of the average Sunday attendance was children and young people aged under 16 years old in 2019, and 12% in 2021.
- The total all age average weekly attendance at services for schools taking place in church was 182,000 people in 2019; and 89,000 people in 2021.

77% of school service attendance was children and young people aged under 16 years old in 2019, and 80% in 2021.

Fresh expressions of church

In October 2021, 13% of churches reported some attendance at in-person fresh expressions of Church (fxCs), down from 21% of churches in October 2019⁶.

The October attendance figures include attendance at church services and at fxCs. Some people attend both; in such cases, to avoid misleadingly inflating the figures through double-counting, we ask that, if possible, attendees are recorded only once per week. Reported attendance at fxCs should therefore be thought of as "additional" attendance, since it might not include those people who also attended a church service in that week.

In 2019 additional attendance at fxCs constituted 5.8% of the October average weekly attendance; in 2021 the figure was 4.3%. The change in adult and child attendance at fxCs was similar (Table 3).


Acts of worship in schools

Churches were less likely to have led acts of worship in schools in 2019 than in 2021. In 2019, 40% of churches led an act of worship in schools once a month or more; the equivalent figure in 2021 was 32% (Table 4; Figure 1).

Baptisms and thanksgivings

The total number of people baptised or for whom a birth or adoption thanksgiving service was held was 89,100 in 2019; 17,100 in 2020; and 55,200 in 2021.

The fall in baptisms from 2019 to 2021 was accompanied by a change in the age groups of people baptised, with a greater fraction of baptisms being of children aged 1-4 than in 20198. This suggests that, as we would expect, some of those people who would have been baptised as babies in 2020 were baptised in 2021 as slightly older children (Table 5).

Thanksgivings made up 3.2% of the total in 2019, and 2.7% of the total in 2021.

Despite the substantial bounce-back in baptism numbers in 2021, there are in the region of 80,000 people who would have been baptised had there not been a pandemic who have not yet been baptised.

Marriages

The total number of marriages and services of prayer and dedication after civil marriage was 31,400 in 2019; 9,200 in 2020; and 26,500 in 2021.

The number of marriages and services of prayer and dedication after civil marriage was at a similar levels in 2021 to what it would have been if pre-pandemic trends had continued. There are in the region of 20,000 weddings that did not take place in churches because of the pandemic.

Services of prayer and dedication after civil marriage made up 6.5% of the total in 2019, and 5.4% of the total in 20219.

Church-level summary information

The continued impact of the pandemic and associated lockdowns on the distribution of church sizes is shown in Table 6. In 2019, a "middle sized" church had an all age average weekly attendance of 34 people; in 2021 it had an all age average weekly attendance of 24 people; in 2020 the equivalent figure was 14 people¹⁰.

Church at Home

A previous publication¹² described in detail the "Church at Home" services – those services offered online, by phone, post, email, and other means – offered by Church of England churches in 2020. As noted in that report, the fact that so many churches, in such challenging circumstances, were able to adapt and continue to serve their communities was incredibly impressive.

Churches were asked about their Church at Home services again in 2021, with the expectation that some Church at Home services would cease to be offered as people resumed worshipping in church. There are several reasons why churches might have stopped offering Church at Home services, including lack of demand and lack of resources to offer Church at Home services as well as in-person services.



In 2020, 71% of churches reported offering at least one type of Church at Home service during October. In 2021, the figure was 58%13.

Churches that offered Church at Home services generally offered them every week; of churches that offered Church at Home services in October 2020, 90% offered them each week, compared to 84% in October 2021.

Of those churches offering Church at Home services in October 2021, 90% offered online services – live-streamed or pre-recorded. Other forms of Church at Home services were also offered, including by telephone, downloaded from a web site or emailed, and by post. When comparing the types of Church at Home service offered in 2021 with those offered in 2020, we see that there has been a fall in the offer of services of all types apart from online services. Online worship remains the dominant type of Church at Home service, with other types less likely to be offered in 2021 than 2020.

As in 2020, churches were asked about the number of people attending their Church at Home services. These numbers are hard to collect reliably, given that it is hard to know how many people are viewing a service on any one device and the fact that many of the measures offered by popular online platforms refer to very short-duration views. It is sensible for churches to monitor the reach of their Church at Home services by whatever means they conveniently can. Large reported figures helpfully highlight those churches whose Church at Home services might be particularly popular. It continues to be the case that aggregating the figures to produce national or diocesan totals would be meaningless, and I advise against it¹⁴.

Churches were also asked to report the number of people in their Worshipping Communities who were entirely or predominantly Church at Home worshippers. Again, this is not always straightforward, particularly given the anonymity of many online platforms. As an indicative aggregate figure, churches reported that about 10% of their Worshipping Community at the end of 2021 was people who were entirely or predominantly Church at Home worshippers.

Longer-term trends





Figure 3: Summary attendance figures, 2009-2021

It is often helpful to consider attendance and participation numbers over a longer time period than just a year or two. Figures 3-8 and Tables 7-9 make it clear what an extraordinary impact the COVID-19 pandemic had on church activities in 2020. For most measures, the sharp fall in 2020 was followed by a steep rise in 2021, entirely as expected.

As previously reported15, most measures of attendance and participation were showing a gradual decline prior to 2020. It is impossible to say what would have happened if there had not been a pandemic, but it is reasonable to assume that the decline would have continued. We would therefore not necessarily expect numbers to return to their 2019 values, even once all pandemic effects have faded away.

Figure 5: Easter attendance and communicants, 2009-2021 17





Figure 6: Christmas attendance and communicants, 2009-2021

Figure 7: Numbers of baptisms, marriages, and funerals, 2009-2021




Figure 8: Numbers of church and crematorium/cemetery funerals, 2009-2021



The final column shows the percentage of churches on which the comparison between 2019 and 2021 figures was based.

Appendix I: Methodology

Where possible, the 2021 Statistics for Mission data collection and analysis followed similar steps to previous years. Some changes were necessary because of the changed circumstances resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. Changes have been noted below.

This report uses data submitted through annual Statistics for Mission returns from churches, and from government statistics. The majority (82%) of the Church of England's almost 16,000 churches submitted data (down from 89% in 2019, and up slightly from 80% in 2020). The reduced response rate in 2020 and 2021 is unsurprising: in light of the pandemic less time was spent encouraging churches to send in their figures. Most returns were on behalf of a single church; a small fraction of returns were joint returns submitted on behalf of several churches. Most returns were submitted through the online parish returns system (https://parishreturns.churchofengland.org/). One diocese used a different electronic system, and some churches completed paper forms.

As in 2020 but unlike in previous years, the figures for 2021 do not include figures from cathedrals, since the 2021 cathedrals dataset is still being analysed.

In several places in this report I have shown comparisons between 2019 and 2021 figures. Wherever possible, these have been carried out using data from the subset of churches that submitted information in both 2019 and 2021, in order that the comparison really is "like for like".

The content of Statistics for Mission

The annual Statistics for Mission return measures several different aspects of church life. While no study could cover every facet of the life of the Church of England, Statistics for Mission seeks to provide a broad picture of those key elements that are common to the vast majority of churches. For reference, the 2021 Statistics for Mission form, including all questions and explanatory notes, can be found in Appendix 2.

A large part of Statistics for Mission is related to attendance at worship services. Attendance is measured in several different ways:

- I) Worshipping Community: those people attending the church regularly, for example at least once a month (or those who would attend if not prevented by illness, infirmity, or temporary absence), including attendance at church services and fresh expressions of Church; in a change from previous years, in 2020 and 2021 churches were asked to include in their Worshipping Community people who regularly "attended" their "Church at Home" services e.g. services that were live streamed, or offered by telephone, or post.
- 2) October count: the number of adults and children attending in person during each of the first 4 weeks of October, at church services, fresh expressions of Church, and services for school taking place in church. Sunday and weekday attendance is asked about, with the instruction that those attending on Sunday and during the week in any given week should only be counted once that week (on Sunday) if possible.
- 3) Number of people attending and number of people receiving communion at Easter and Christmas (Christmas Eve and Christmas Day).
- 4) The Electoral roll of the church.

Unlike in previous years, churches were not asked to report their Usual Sunday attendance in 2020 or 2021 (since "Usual Sunday" did not really apply to much of 2020 and 2021). In 2020 churches were not asked to report their Easter attendance and communicants figures (most churches were closed at Easter 2020) or their attendance at services for schools taking place in church in October, but these questions were re-introduced in 2021.

Churches were asked to report the age distribution of their Worshipping Community and the numbers of adults and children leaving and joining their Worshipping Community.

The October count data are used to calculate average weekly and average Sunday attendance, for adults and children. Average Sunday attendance is defined as the total attendance at church services or fresh expressions of Church on Sundays over the 4 weeks of the October count, divided by 4. Average weekly attendance is defined as the total attendance at church services or fresh expressions of Church on Sundays or weekdays over the 4 weeks of the October count, divided by 4. Churches are asked to include attendance at baptisms in their October count, since baptisms often take place as part of normal worship services, but not attendance at weddings and funerals.

Statistics for Mission quantifies numbers of baptisms and services of thanksgiving for the gift (birth or adoption) of a child; marriages and services of prayer and dedication after civil marriages; and funeral services conducted on behalf of the church/parish by any minister held in church or at a crematorium or cemetery (excluding committal only and burial of ashes only). Note that funerals conducted by licensed Church of England ministers that are not held on behalf of a church/parish might not be included in the reported figures.

Additionally, Statistics for Mission asks about attendance at special services during Advent and details of fresh expressions of Church.

Unlike in previous years, churches were not asked about members of ministry teams leading assemblies in schools in 2020; this question was reintroduced in 2021.

In 2020 a one off question was included asking about the "Church at Home" services that churches may have been offering or referring people to; a slightly shorter version of this question was asked in 2021.

Data accuracy and data checking

Data reported by each church were compared with figures from previous years, and substantial changes were queried with churches and/or dioceses. Predominantly, these checks corrected typographical errors during data entry, although they also highlighted occasions when questions had been misinterpreted. The first stage of checks was automatic, at the point of data entry, for those returns submitted through the online parish returns system. Further checking was carried out by staff in the Data Services team, with particular scrutiny of figures that had changed significantly from year to year, and of unusually large (or small) values. Useful additional explanation and information was often provided by churches in the comments box on the Statistics for Mission return; as far as resources permitted, comments were read and acted on where appropriate. Where it was necessary to query any of the figures submitted, in the vast majority of cases this was done directly with the person who entered the figures; we are grateful for their helpful responses to our queries.

The 2020 and 2021 datasets were checked using an adapted version of the usual process. In normal times, large increases or large decreases would be queried; given the circumstances, for variables other than Electoral roll and Worshipping Community it did not seem sensible to query large decreases.

Where estimation has been required to provide national or diocesan totals, the figures used in this report have been calculated using several different approaches. Figures up to 2019 have been taken from previous publications, and are based on the methodology as described in detail in Statistics for Mission 2019 (https://www.churchofengland.org/media/21969). In broad summary, for those churches that did not send in their figures estimates were carried out church-by-church based on data received from those churches in other years.

Figures for 2020 and 2021 were calculated using a different approach, since the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic means that church-level estimates are unlikely to be reliable. Figures for 2020 were calculated by looking at the subset of churches that submitted data in 2019 and 2020, and using data from these churches to estimate diocesan and national trends, with 2019 as the baseline. Figures for 2021 were calculated by looking at the subset of churches that submitted data in 2019 and 2021, and using data from these churches to estimate diocesan and national trends, using 2019 as the baseline; this subset includes 76% of Church of England churches. These calculated trends were used to estimate diocesan totals. It was assumed that the trend in these churches was representative of the diocese as a whole.

Unlike for most other variables, until 2019 no estimation of school service attendance or Advent attendance was carried out for those churches that did not submit figures; as a consequence of the change in estimation methodology, estimation for these variables was carried out for 2020 and 2021. Changes in school service and Advent attendance over time up until 2019 will therefore, in part, be related to changes in the set of churches from which information was received.

Values in the data tables are reported to the nearest 1000, 100 or 10, as appropriate. Percentages are reported to the nearest 1% or 0.1%, as appropriate. Totals, percentages, and averages have been calculated before rounding, so row and column totals may not always agree with the sums of the amounts shown.

Reliability of the figures

For most variables, there is no reason to suppose that figures have been reported less accurately this year than usual. The exception is Worshipping Community, where churches were endeavouring to include their regular "Church at Home"

worshippers. Given the anonymity of many forms of Church at Home this is more challenging than reporting an in-person Worshipping Community, and there is likely to be more guesswork involved. Respondents were doing their best in difficult circumstances.

As far as it is possible to tell this has not resulted in any particularly odd numbers once figures are aggregated to diocesan level, but we ought to treat the Worshipping Community figures with more caution than usual.

Representativeness of the sample

Of course, it is impossible to tell whether non-responding churches differed from responding churches in terms of the impact of the pandemic. However, on the basis of their 2019 All age average weekly attendance, the dataset included in the analysis is broadly representative, slightly oversampling large churches. The impact of the pandemic on churches' reported figures is reasonably consistent across church size, so the effect of this oversampling is likely to be small and not worth attempting to adjust for.

I calculated estimated figures for 2021, using the same methodology (i.e. based on the subset of churches from whom data had been received in 2019 and 2021) at several points as data were coming in, and there is no indication that the early-responding churches were notably different in terms of their attendance and participation trends than the later-responding churches.

Age groups

Ideally, a single set of age groups would be used throughout the Statistics for Mission return. However, for a variety of reasons, this has not been the case in the past, and the desire to be able to make comparisons with historical data has discouraged further changes.

- October count attendance is divided into adults (aged 16 and over) and children and young people (aged under 16).
- Worshipping Community age groups are 0-10; 11-17; 18-69, and 70+, while leavers and joiners are categorised as adults (aged 18+) and children and young people (aged under 18).
- Baptisms and thanksgivings are categorised as infants (aged <1 year); children aged 1-4 years; children aged 5-10 years; young people aged 11-17, and adults (aged 18+); this is a slight change from the age groups used until 2018, when there was a group for children aged 5-12 and young people/adults aged 13 and over were grouped together.

Diocesan boundaries

Diocesan and parish boundaries as of 1st January 2021 were used as the basis for the collection of Statistics for Mission data.

Unlike in previous years, figures for the Channel Islands have been included with those for the Diocese of Salisbury. However, given that the pandemic followed a different course in the Channel Islands from that on the mainland, estimated totals were calculated separately for the Channel Islands before being added to figures relating to churches on the mainland.

Population data

Because of staffing constraints, it has not been possible to calculate updated estimates of diocesan populations.

Diocesan population statistics were estimated using data published by the Office for National Statistics (ONS: http://www.ons.gov.uk/ons/index.html), mapped on to diocesan boundaries. This mapping is an approximation, since the boundaries of regions at which population data are reported do not coincide with diocesan boundaries. The latest available data were used wherever possible; population estimates and numbers of births and deaths are from mid-2020. Data for the Isle of Man have been taken from http://countrymeters.info/en/lsle_of_Man; data for the Channel Islands have been taken from http://countrymeters.info/en/Channel_Islands (both relating to the Ist of January 2021, and accessed 24th November 2021).


