## Inspection findings

By mindfully maintaining a loving environment, which deeply values everyone, all are able to flourish. The school's Christian vision is the foundation that reminds all that they are loved as precious gifts from God. The knowledgeable local governing body hold leaders to account and simultaneously ensure that staff wellbeing is prioritised. They exhibit Christian love in their deliberations, focussing upon the precious nature of each pupil and adult. The school's partnerships are mutually supportive, especially between schools within the Diocese of Sheffield Academy Trust. While the vision underlies daily leadership actions, using it to review decisions is not explicit. For example, it is not used to support monitoring or in public documentation. The school is very welcoming, achieves highly and celebrates each pupil for their unique talents. By harnessing and cherishing each pupil's abilities all are encouraged to be the best that they can be. Leaders consistently have high expectations for each pupil.

The dedicated prayer space in each classroom provides all with the opportunity for peaceful reflection. While consistently invitational, pupils pray together at specific times throughout the day. They explore expressing their thanks, concerns and feelings through prayer. Pupils confidently explain how prayer enables them to have a close relationship with God and that they can pray anywhere. While invitational prayer is a significant feature of the school's practice, there is no established common understanding of spirituality. This limits how pupils make the most of reflection times.

Partnership with the church enables a strong pastoral support to influence the wellbeing of the whole community. This positive relationship enhances the school's ethos and supports the school's Christian vision. Reflecting the calendar and pattern of Anglican worship pupils attend church for major festivals. The school invites members of the church to join worship in school. Pupils frequently organise and lead collective worship, reflecting upon the school's vision and Christian values. The involvement of pupils, through the religious education and collective worship council, promotes a child led evaluation of worship. Through the use of liturgy pupils build their knowledge of the traditions of the Anglican church. Collective worship enriches and maintains the bond between members of this thriving community. It offers the whole community a time of reflection and unity because it is inviting, inclusive and inspiring.

Pupils are passionate about addressing social injustice and taking care of one another in challenging times. They support a range of charities, but moreover instigate action ranging from environmental concerns to health and wellbeing. Through the school's woodland workshop pupils engage with environmental learning, reflecting upon how to be stewards of God's world. Leaders encourage pupils to communicate their concerns through pupil led assemblies. The school is proactive in raising awareness of the need to challenge inequality through a variety of partner organisations. For example, through Action Aid the school has achieved a Global Neighbours Award. This develops an awareness of issues and dilemmas, injustice, discrimination and exploitation, inspiring pupils to become agents for positive change.

Supported by the vision, leadership are consistently mindful that all members of this community must flourish. Leaders make bold decisions for the good of the individual pupil. Consequently, the most vulnerable receive the support that they need to thrive. Developing opportunities to become increasingly resilient, staff develop pupils' self-confidence, enabling pupils to be the best that they can be. Staff access rich professional development along with the space to reflect and develop their practice. Parents are invited to informative workshops where staff share the pupils' learning experiences. Parents delight in how their children are enthusiastic to come to school, how they strongly identify the school as theirs. They note how pupils build strong friendships across year groups and attribute this to how each person is

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valued. The school utilises the vision as a springboard to sustain high expectations while celebrating each pupil and adult. The mutually supportive staff report that leaders are mindful of their wellbeing and that workload is well managed. Staff feel that they have a voice and that consequently they can influence decision making.

Religious Education (RE) is an extremely safe space where pupils actively explore Christianity and a range of world faiths. They are deeply respectful of the beliefs of others. Pupils say that they are always able to offer their carefully considered opinions and do so with confidence. They are rightly proud of their learning and articulately share their knowledge and understanding, engaging each other in discussions. Pupils immerse themselves in RE lessons. They demonstrate excellent retrieval of knowledge by referring to prior learning. They are eager to debate big questions and delight in respectfully challenging each other in the light of informed discussions. Pupils demonstrate their ability to be critical thinkers. Leaders of RE are very knowledgeable and their passion for the subject is contagious. They ensure that pupils have real life experiences to enhance their understanding of faith and religion in the wider world. For example, the school invites pupils from other schools to share their faith experiences. This enhances respectful awareness of a multicultural and multi-faith world. Expertise amongst the staff enables RE lessons to be taught confidently. This is enhanced through resources such as 'Understanding Christianity', which develop pupils' religious literacy.

The school's vision enables this community to be harmonious. Leaders leave no stone unturned to ensure that the pupils receive tailored opportunities to grow. There is a deep respect for the infinite worth and value of every pupil. It is a peaceful place for pupils to live, learn and flourish. Consequently, pupils are well behaved, care compassionately for each other, their teachers and the wider community.

Leaders ensure that all pupils, regardless of age, are challenged through an ambitious yet balanced RE curriculum. Pupils receive a meticulously planned, and and sequential experience.
