## Disability and Church buildings:







Something other than a car...!

Not wide enough, can't open both doors, bollards restricting access to the path





Dedicated and clearly marked/signed
Wide enough for both doors







Loose gravel, narrow paths, tight turns – a hazard for wheelchairs, buggies, scooters, crutches, walking sticks...





Resin bound compacted gravel, clear edges, low level lighting, trip-free flagstones



Step free access from kerb to front door – and a gentle gradient







30 well-worn Victorian steps with intermittent handrails across gates – the lift was behind industrial bins with no signage and locked access..





Handrail, and push button door access







No choice for wheelchair users, restricted seating for anyone with mobility/back/joint problems, trip hazards, unable to improve sight lines

You will sit here...
No agency



Flexible seating gives
agency and choice
Level access
Step/trip free
Can adapt to sight lines
Multi use space



Would need more contrast between floor colour and seats







Communion wine stored in the toilet...





Clutter free disabled toilet,
sliding (pocket) door, colour contrasts,
grab rails, paper towels,
baby change, large turning circle

\*emergency cord was tied up ☺
\*toilet flush was a reach over the toilet ☺





Wheelchair level bar
Door hook for ambulant
users, needs a second lower
one for wheelchair users





Access for the congregation – but only as far as the Chancel steps...



Step free access from nave area to the chancel with a gentle gradient







Sensory over-stimulus caused by light or sound





Poor/no sound amplification, t-loops not installed/working or out of date technology










