

2. The *envisaged* path forward...

Organisational Preparedness

- Desktop research
- Develop resources for staff
- Record and share research findings with local community for individual churches
- Understand where Contested Heritage is being raised as an issue amongst our communities / core audiences
- ✓ Internal reporting and monitoring, linking in to EDI Committee
- Plan internal communications
- Identify, mitigate and manage additional risks as appropriate

Internal Pilot & Sector-sharing

- More thorough research into a selection of CCT sites
- Engage local communities and new, target audiences, with/ about the heritage
- Develop pilot to temporarily interpret the history, always gathering feedback
- Share our Approach so far with partner organisations and stakeholders
- Develop methodologies and approaches to interpretation
- Review of sites, web descriptions, Walk Round Guides, etc


Public Engagement

- ✓ Public-facing communications
- Broader programme of interpretation
- ✓ Identify new/ stretch audiences who might want to be consulted on managing/ interpreting the Contested Heritage
- Communicate with our communities, supporters and stakeholders
- ✓ Evaluate and monitor progress
- ✓ Honesty and transparency is key!

3. Desktop Research: Key Findings

43%

of CCT churches have – or are likely to have – tangible links with the historic, trans-Atlantic trade in trafficked & enslaved peoples and British occupation of India



Of the 90 people associated with CCT churches and documented to have links to these histories...

- were enslaved or formerly enslaved and living in English parishes
- of the 79 people documented to with links were closely associated with abolitionism
- were slave/plantation 'owners' or traders
- were senior colonial officials
- inherited wealth from Transatlantic trafficking, including compensation


