




We launched our new Strategy on 2 March, setting out our strategic direction for the next 10 years, grounded on stakeholder and sector input.

# How feedback shaped the strategy

- Over 4,000 stakeholders and members of the public shared their views on heritage and our future direction.
- Research agency, Britain Thinks, were commissioned to examine public and stakeholder views and priorities.
- All of this informed our new strategy including our new four investment principles.

## Our Approach

- Our successful open programmes will continue with devolved decisionmaking, using the local knowledge and expertise of our committees in the English areas and nations.
- The current upper level for **Delegated Officer decision-making** of £250k will remain the same for the duration of the first three-year delivery plan.
- We have announced that the upper grant threshold is now £10 million.
- Successful delivery will require partnerships that combine resources and expertise to create investments with greater impact.
- A focus on place, landscape and nature, heritage in need, and responding to opportunities and emergencies.



### **Places of Worship: funding context**



- National Lottery Heritage Fund has invested over £1 billion in places of worship heritage since 1994
- 10-15% of the lottery money we distribute goes to PoW projects every year

£247,000 grant includes Spire repair required to reduce heritage risk

### Ecochurch investment:

- Local supply chains
- Community café focus on sustainability
- Community gardening space















### **Bats In Churches**

£4 million+ partnership to trial and improve techniques to enable bats and church congregations to live together and share solutions.

Build up professional expertise and volunteer skills, over 600 volunteers engaged

bring together the expertise and dynamism of church communities and bat enthusiasts

New engagement: school visits and free e-learning course for church volunteers and staff.



- £1.7million awarded to the National Churches Trust
- Building on a Northern Ireland model
- Increased organisational capacity to care for heritage

### Timelines and next steps

- 2023/24 is a transition year:
- New maximum grant threshold of £10 million: now live
- Last applications £10,000 and £10 million under SFF: November 2023
- Last applications for grants up to £10,000; December 2033
- Applications for grants £10,000-£10 million reopening: January 2024
- For now: continue to apply with our current guidance and application forms
