

UNEQUALLY YOKED? THE CHURCH'S WITNESS AND **JESUS' TEACHING ON MARRIAGE**

Different groups within the Church are being called to walk together, despite holding divergent views on marriage.

Come and hear testimony from clergy who have already suffered for holding to the Church of England's doctrine of marriage.

SPEAKERS

- Rev. Duncan Beet Ordained for 23 years, Duncan is Rector of Sileby, Cossington & Seagrave in the Diocese of Leicester. He published an article on his parish Facebook page stating that marriage was between a man and a woman.
- Rev. James Goodwin-Hudson James has served as chaplain in a Church of England boarding school for five years. He sought to be faithful to his call and uphold marriage within the school's context.
- Rev. Barry Unwin Barry is priest-in-charge of Hope Church Family in Worcester Diocese and represents the Diocese on the board of a local education trust. He wrote to his congregation explaining the teaching of the Church on marriage.
- Rev. Bernard Randall Bernard was working as a school chaplain in a school with an Anglican evangelical ethos, when he preached a sermon stating biblical views on marriage.
