Pupils embrace all that the school offers. Inspection findings

In this highly inclusive environment, everyone is well supported and g trusting and caring relationships are central to this. Restorative behaviour				



practices allow all to show respect. Pupils and adults treat each other with dignity. In this nurturing school everyone feels loved and cared for. At the heart of this is the clearly expressed vision and carefully selected values of love, respect and trust. Through their commitment leaders ensure all opportunities to grow and flourish are taken. Leaders make courageous financial decisions. Pupils who have special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), receive highly personalised learning experiences to meet their diverse needs. The school supports vulnerable pupils enabling them to feel safe and valued. Adults feel valued and well supported increasing their confidence and skills. Committed governors embrace the vision driving their strategic decision making. Governors undertake monitoring of RE and worship. They are less experienced in understanding the monitoring evidence about worship on pupils' lives or the quality of RE learning. Staff create trusting relations with parents involving them in their child's learning. Parents value this unified, inclusive school in whom they have complete trust. A refreshed partnership between the new vicar and the school is beginning to grow with opportunities for deepening community connectedness.

A thoughtfully crafted curriculum is rooted in the belief that God's plan is for everyone to flourish. Its design provides for all learners to develop, recognise their gifts and embrace fulsome learning. An older pupil described flourishing as, 'growing wings, spreading and expanding knowledge, learning new things and flying better'. Pupils are enthusiastic about school life. The wider curriculum includes music, sport, gardening and outdoor learning enabling pupils to gain a sense of self-worth. The vision facilitates and contributes well to pupils' spiritual development. A year 6 pupil describes spirituality as 'the spark the world has chosen for you'.

As a largely monocultural school, there is an emphasis on widening pupils' understanding of diversity. This is based on the belief that everyone is made in God's image. This is reflected in text choice such as 'No outsiders in our school'. Encouraging a sense of belonging to a wider community and planned opportunities for spiritual development are strong threads throughout the curriculum. Looking after God's world is a key driver in shaping the curriculum. The school received the 'Green Flag' award for environmental actions. Pupils explore themes of responsibility and justice such in the text 'Suffragettes', and in the work of Gandhi and Greta Thunberg. Older pupils talk knowingly about celebrating differences where everyone is unique and has a place in the world. Trying your best to be a good friend and form positive relationships is also firmly expressed by pupils.

Worship is intrinsic to the life of the school. It provides a rich source of opportunities for all to be still, reflect or pray. It contributes well to the development of pupils' personal spirituality. Pupils talk with enthusiasm about learning from Bible stories. They match them to school values and their daily lives. Adults value worship and recognise the contribution to their own spirituality. It's an opportunity to 'look inside and see who I am' and 'be part of something bigger'. During worship staff sensitively support those pupils who need reassurance. The invitation for families to join the 'celebration' worship gives a powerful sense of togetherness. Opportunities for prayer and reflection are frequent throughout the day keeping the vision alive in hearts and minds. The impact of collective worship on the school community is profound. It is integral to the exploration of the school's vision.

Pupils positively engage in social action. Their understanding of the causes they support and the impact of social action on others is in the early stages of development. Ethical choices such as wanting to make the school 'plastic free,' reduce food waste and save water have been identified. Pupils rightly feel strongly that we need to 'look after the planet'. These initiatives support their understanding of global challenges such as climate change and the protection of endangered animals. This promotes an understanding of justice and responsibility. Curriculum resources are used to explore local, national and global issues. Pupils are less aware of how they can act independently to challenge injustice and be change makers.



The school's RE curriculum is effective. Leaders ensure it has a high priority and profile. It meets the needs of all pupils including those with SEND. The effective RE leader shares good practice and leads professional development increasing teachers confidence and expertise. This makes a positive impact on pupils' learning. The curriculum is well sequenced and balanced where learning is frequently revisited and progressively built on. Age-appropriate enquiry skills are incorporated into the curriculum where pupils ask and answer 'big questions' using Bible stories to illustrate ideas. Younger pupils talk explain that Joseph forgave his brothers even though they betrayed him. Older pupils suggest God's wisdom is seen in sending Jesus who loves us. Pupils understand the importance of being able to reflect on their own opinion and those of others. They learn about about Christianity as a global religion as in Nigeria as well as range of other religions and world views. This enriches their understanding of difference and helps them to respect other faiths and cultures. Pupils talk thoughtfully about world views recognising the importance of belief and how this shapes lives. A supportive partnership with the diocese provides effective training. RE lessons provide a safe place for pupils to express their opinions. Therefore, they demonstrate deep thinking and write inspirational spiritual reflections.

This small but outward looking school is infused with its Christian vision inspired learning for fulness of life. This has generated a community that serves all with love, respect and trust creating an exceptional place of learning.

The inspection findings indicate that Ettington VC Primary School is living up to its foundation as a church school.
