Foreword

Cathedrals attract people for many different reasons: because of their liturgy, their music, their historical significance, their art and their architecture. They offer worship in intimate side-chapels and vast naves. They offer peace, prayer, and silence, and outpourings of joyful noise.

Like many people, in 2022 I attended cathedrals for a number of purposes: to take part in “normal” acts of worship; to sing; to listen to concerts; to find a bit of peace and quiet, and to visit the cafe. For me, though, the occasion that recalls the most joy was attending a diocesan service for the Admission and Licensing of Lay Ministers. Of the hundreds of people in the congregation, most of us were visitors, from dozens of churches across the diocese, there to support and cheer on family and friends as they took another step in their lives of ministry and service. The cathedral was our gracious host, offering a welcoming place where different communities could gather together and celebrate. That welcome was much appreciated.

The figures published in this report can, of course, only hope to cover a subset of the many and varied ways in which cathedrals serve their communities. They illustrate some of the scale and breadth of that service and highlight, as ever, the significance of cathedrals in the lives of many.

Summary

For the Church of England’s cathedrals, as for churches more generally, 2022 was another year of post-pandemic bounce-back. By most measures, levels of attendance and participation in 2022 were higher than in 2021 while remaining lower than in 2019.

As well as once again welcoming in-person worshippers, school groups, musicians, and visitors, cathedrals continued to offer “Church at Home” services – those services offered online, by phone, post, email, and other means – in 2022. Cathedrals’ ability and willingness to offer a wide variety of forms of worship has, once again, been appreciated by many.

This report presents information about worship and other activities taking place in Church of England cathedrals from 1st January to 31st December 2022. Data were sought from all 42 mainland Church of England cathedrals and from Westminster Abbey, through the annual cathedral statistics survey. Among other things, the survey asked about attendance at Sunday and midweek services; Easter and Christmas services; school visits; baptisms, marriages, and funerals; musical activities and volunteering. The survey form and guidance notes can be found in Appendix 4.

This report contains information provided by Head Vergers, Chief Operating Officers, and Deans, to whom we are very grateful.

Recent trends in cathedral attendance and participation

The COVID-19 pandemic that began in 2020 had a huge effect on the worshipping life of cathedrals, as it did on so many aspects of life. As expected, many measures of cathedral attendance and participation fell sharply in 2020, recovering somewhat in 2021. Most measures further recovered in 2022, while remaining below their 2019 levels (Table 1). For example, Adult usual Sunday attendance rose by 60% from 2021 to 2022, but was 20% below its 2019 level.

The Community Roll and funerals numbers are exceptions to the general pattern, both remaining much more stable over the course of the pandemic than other measures. These exceptions are unsurprising: Community Roll is not a measure of attendance, and funeral services were able to continue, albeit with restrictions, during the pandemic. Marriages are another exception, being in 2022 9% above their 2019 level; this suggests that some marriages that were not able to take place in cathedrals during the pandemic have subsequently been rescheduled.

Patterns of cathedral attendance and participation are, in general, similar to those seen in other Church of England churches, as described in detail in the 2022 Statistics for Mission report¹.

Further details and longer-term trends can be seen in the figures and tables in the remainder of this report.

Regular Attendance

Usual Sunday and Midweek Attendance

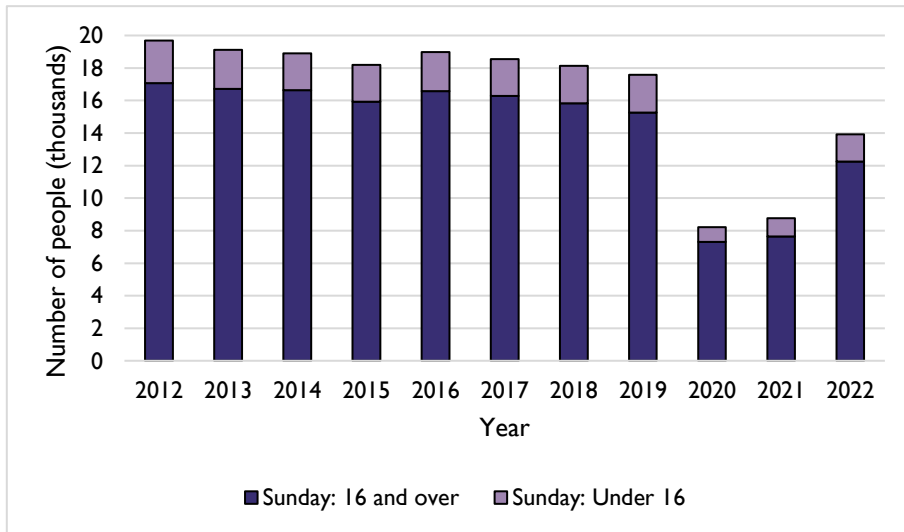
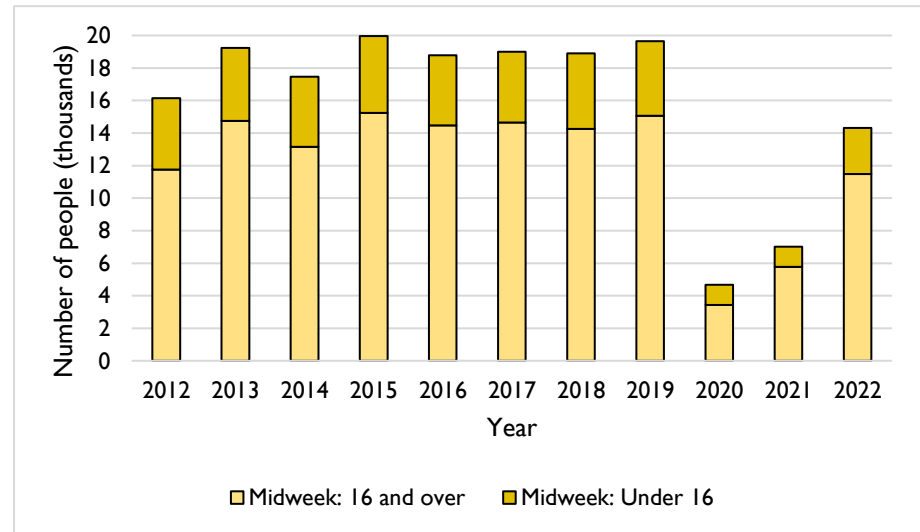


Figure 2: Midweek attendance (per week) at Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022

Figures 1 and 2 show the usual Sunday and midweek attendance, per week, at all 42 Church of England mainland cathedrals at services on the weekly calendar in a 'normal' week. For data from before 2020, a 'normal' week refers to those weeks that are not major festivals or contained in a peak holiday period, and that do not include special events or services; from 2020 onwards the question asked about attendance during October. This difference may affect the comparability of the figures between years.

Data are separated into Sunday and midweek attendance, where the midweek count includes services held Monday to Saturday. People attending more than one service on the same day or in the same week were, wherever possible, only counted once no matter how many services they attended.

Figure 1: Sunday attendance (per week) at Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022

In 2022, a weekly total of 28,200 people (of whom 84% were adults and 16% were children) were reported attending cathedral services. This is 79% more than the equivalent figure from 2021, and a 24% decrease on the 2019 figure.

Figure 3: Usual Sunday and midweek attendance (per week) at Church of England cathedrals, 1995-2022²

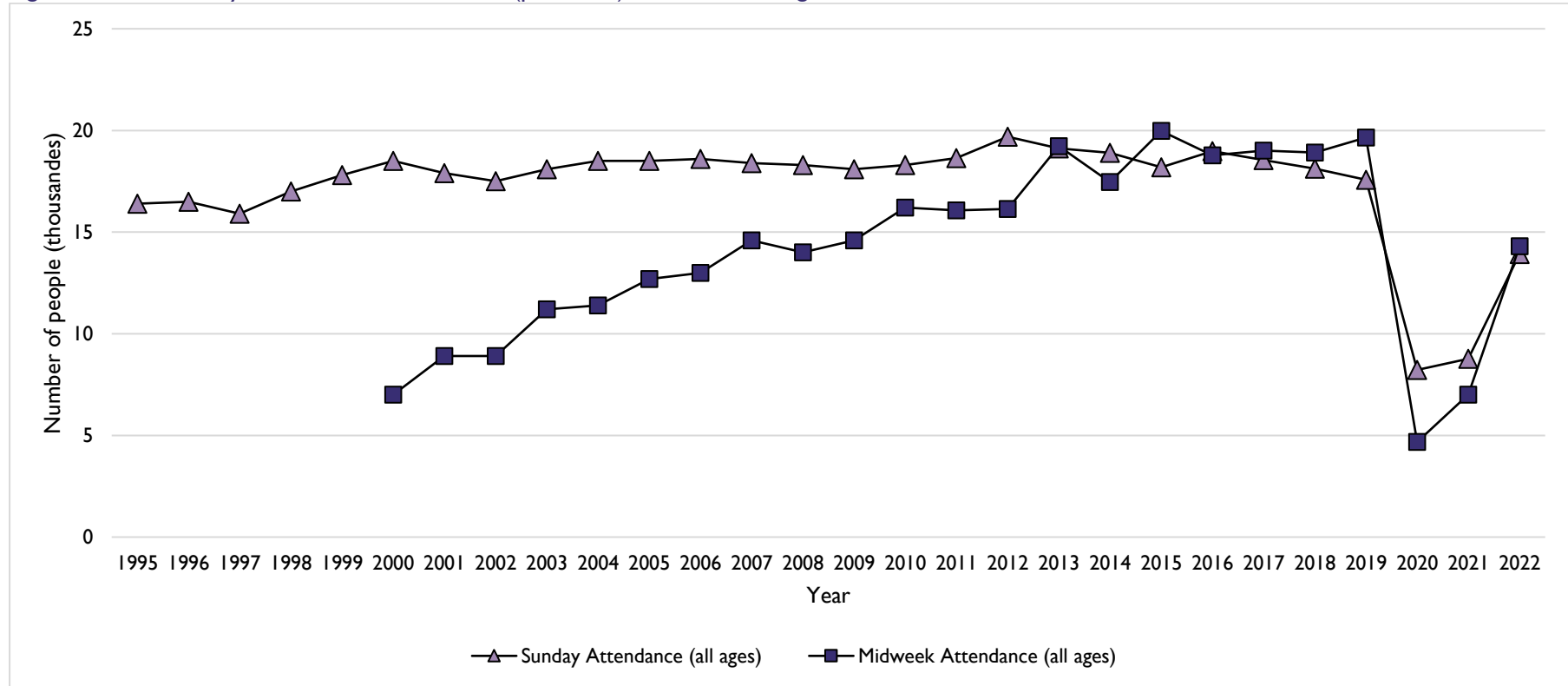


Figure 3 shows usual weekly attendance at Sunday and midweek services from 1995-2022. Sunday attendance was fairly stable from 2000-2019. Reported midweek attendance rose from 7,000 people per week in 2000 (when first reported) to a peak of 19,900 people per week in 2015, since when it remained stable until 2019. Attendance at midweek services showed a sharper fall in 2020 and a faster recovery in 2021 and 2022 than attendance at Sunday services.

Additional Regular Services

Figure 4 shows the total reported annual attendance at ‘regular’ services. These refer to additional services that happen at least once a month but not necessarily weekly and that are not part of the weekly pattern of services (i.e. those included in Figures 1 and 2).

Three categories are shown: regular fresh expressions of Church (and other community services); regular services for schools; and all other regular services. Attendance at fresh expressions of Church is also shown in Figure 4b, to show the change between years more clearly.

Figure 4a: Total annual attendance at regular services at Church of England cathedrals, 2013-2022³

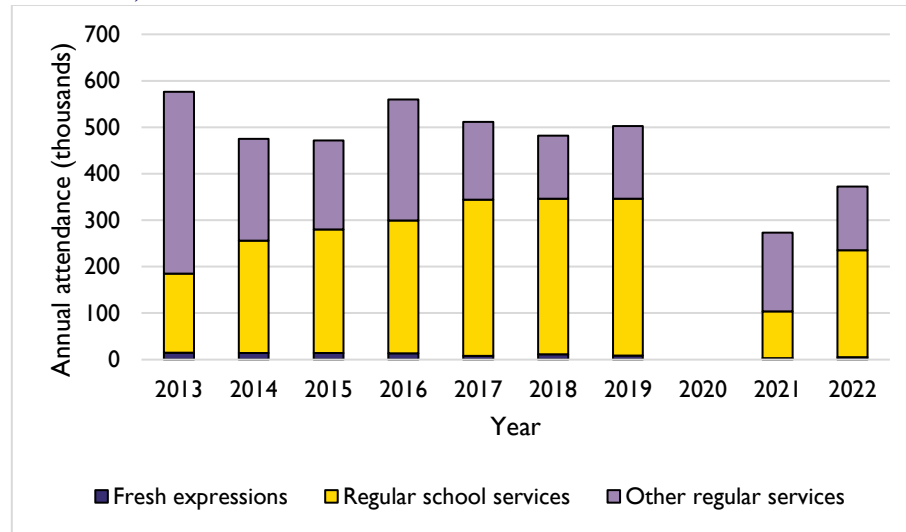
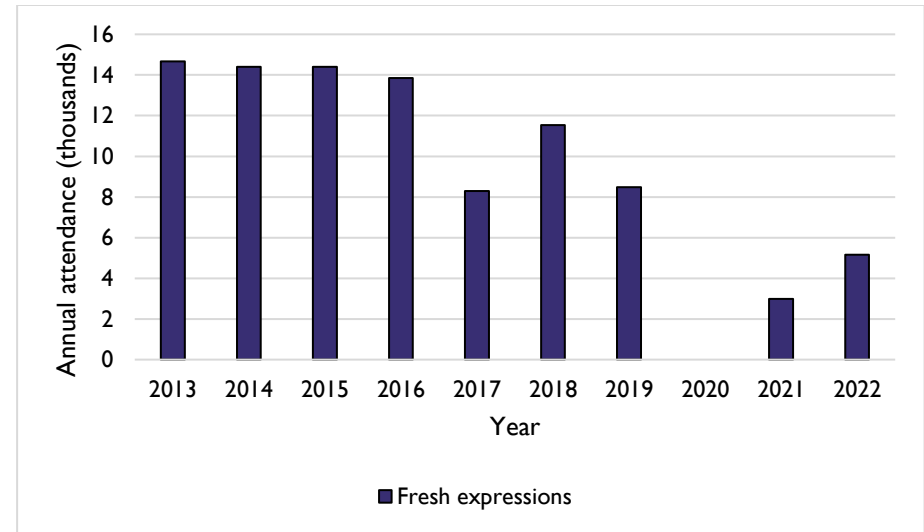


Figure 4b: Total annual attendance at Fresh expressions of Church, 2013-2022



An annual attendance of 372,700 was reported at regular services conducted at least once a month (including fresh expressions of Church and school services), as shown in Figure 4.

An annual attendance of 5,200 was reported at fresh expressions of Church in 2022.

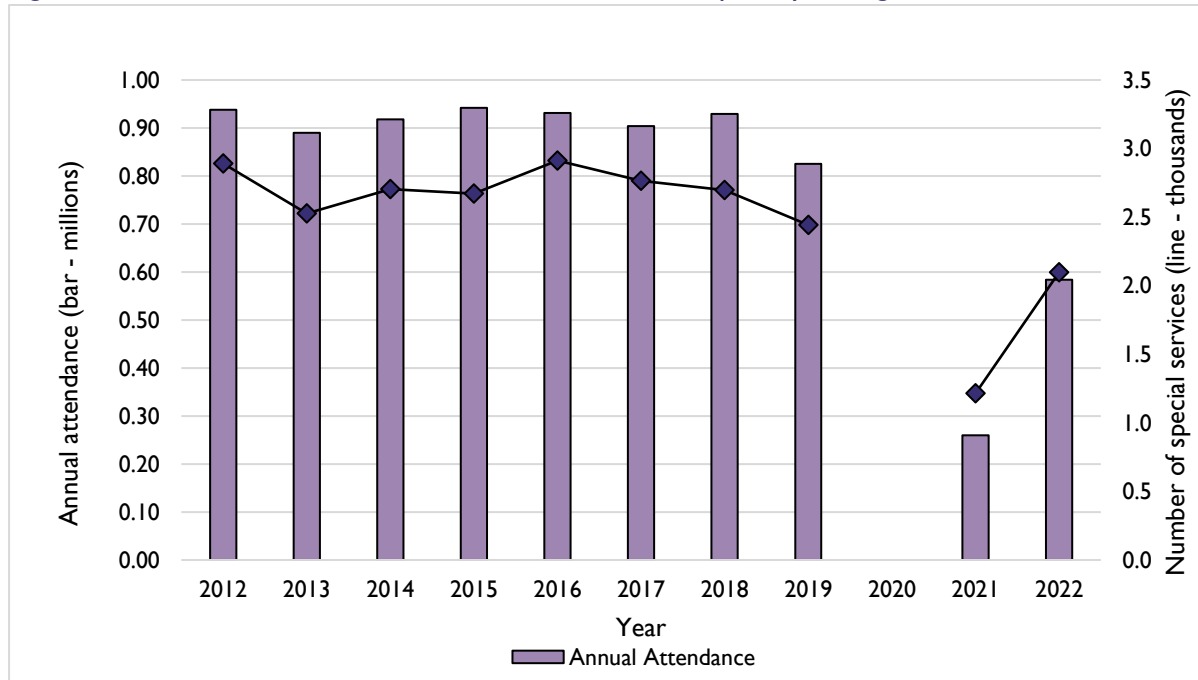

Special Event Attendance

Attendance at specially arranged services is not included in average weekly attendance, shown in Figure 1, or the total annual attendance for regular services, shown in Figure 4, as they are not part of the regular pattern of services; attendance at specially arranged services is reported separately in this section.

Figure 5 shows the total number of people reported annually at ‘specially arranged services’, which includes diocesan or episcopal services (such as annual festivals / diocesan services), irregular services for schools (for example, an end of term / year service), other special services (excluding memorials) and services away from the cathedral building.

An annual attendance of 584,000 was reported at specially arranged services at Church of England cathedrals in 2022. The number of special services held was 2,100.

Attendance at specially arranged services in 2022 is broken down as follows: 98,000 at 400 diocesan or episcopal services; 227,000 at 450 specially arranged school services; 233,000 at 1,000 other special services; 26,000 at 230 services held away from the cathedral.

Figure 6: Annual number of and total annual attendance at public / civic events at Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022⁵

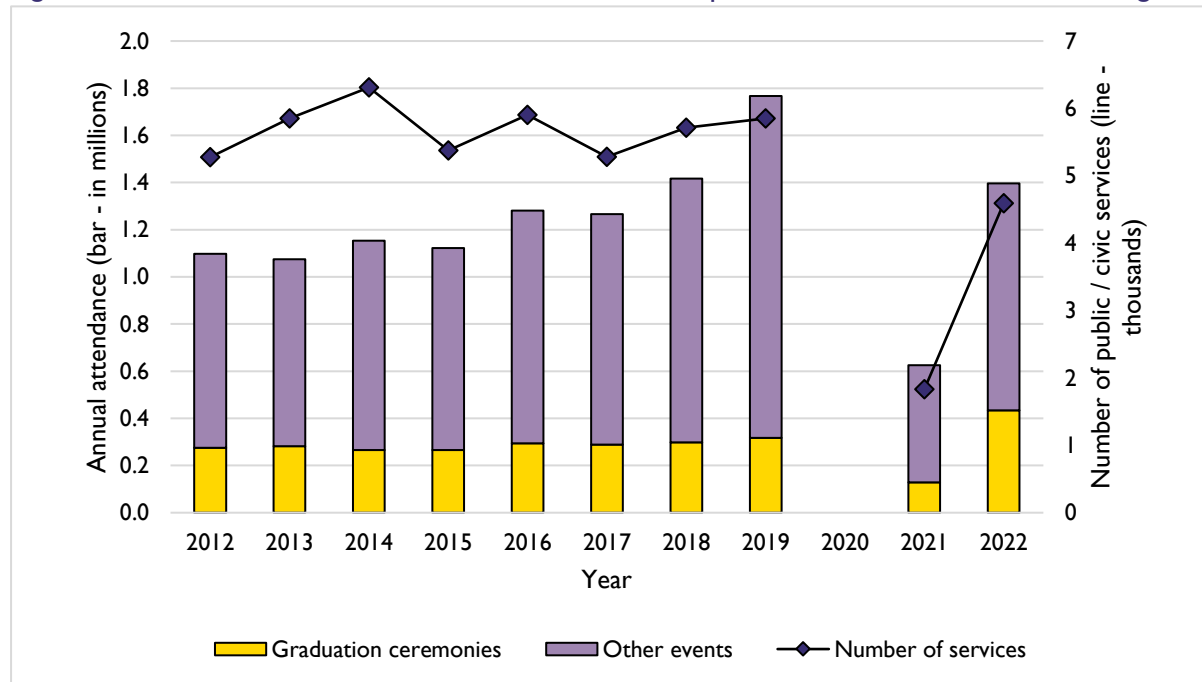


Figure 6 shows the total number of people reported attending public or civic events, which includes graduation ceremonies, conferences, concerts and meetings.

The total reported number of public / civic events in cathedrals in 2022 was 4,600, with a total attendance at these events of 1,400,000, as shown in Figure 5.

Attendance is broken down as follows: 434,000 at 530 graduation ceremonies; 962,000 at 4,100 other public / civic events.

Easter and Holy Week Attendance

Figure 7a shows the total number of people reported as attending services at Church of England cathedrals over Easter (including vigil services on Easter Eve). All data include adults, children and young people, clergy and laity, and the attendance figure includes both communicants and those that did not receive communion. Figure 7b shows attendance during Holy Week specified, since 2014, as the period from Palm Sunday to Good Friday. This information was first recorded in 2010 but without this clarification. Therefore extra data may have been included in Holy Week prior to 2014; thus only data from 2014 onwards are shown. Note that no in-person Easter services were permitted to take place in 2020 due to the lockdown restrictions that were in place at the time.

Figure 7a: Easter attendance at Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022

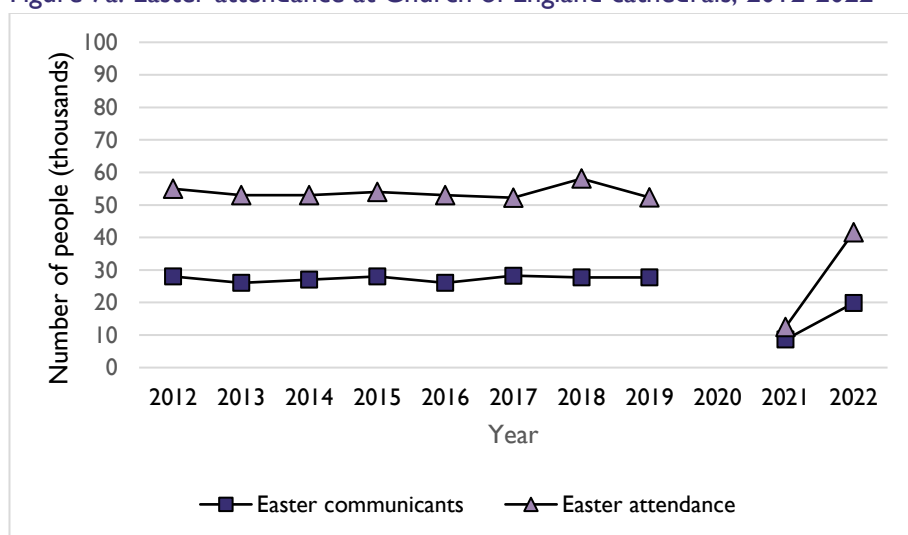
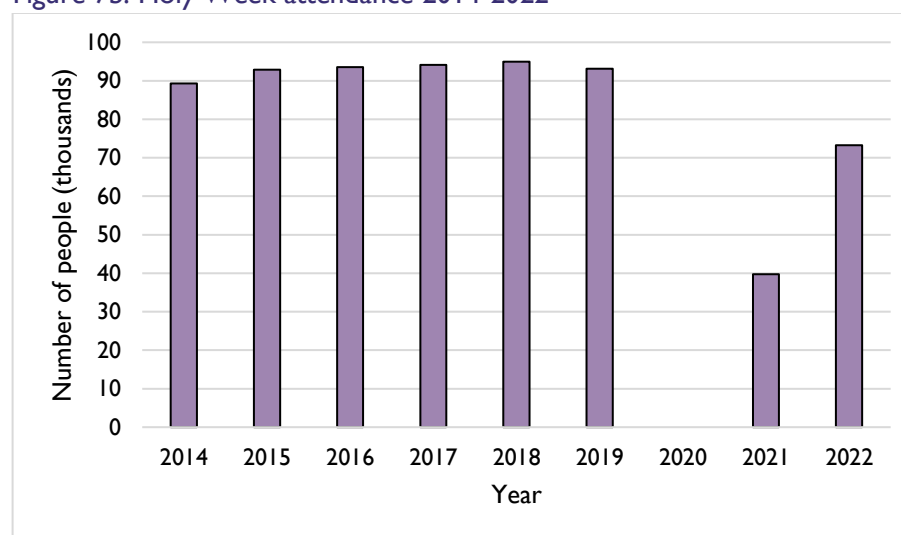


Figure 7b: Holy Week attendance 2014-2022⁶



In 2022, total reported attendance at Easter services was 42,000. Of those who attended services at Easter 2022, 20,000 received communion, 48% of those who attended.

A total attendance of 73,000 was reported at services during Holy Week in 2022.

Christmas and Advent Attendance

Figure 8a shows the total number of people reported attending Church of England cathedrals on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. All data include adults, children and young people, clergy and laity, and the attendance figure includes both communicants and those that did not receive communion. Figure 8b shows attendance during Advent which, since 2014, was specified as the period from Advent Sunday to 23 December. Prior to 2014 the definitions varied slightly from year to year meaning data may not be comparable; thus, only data from 2014 onwards are shown.

Figure 8a: Christmas attendance at Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022

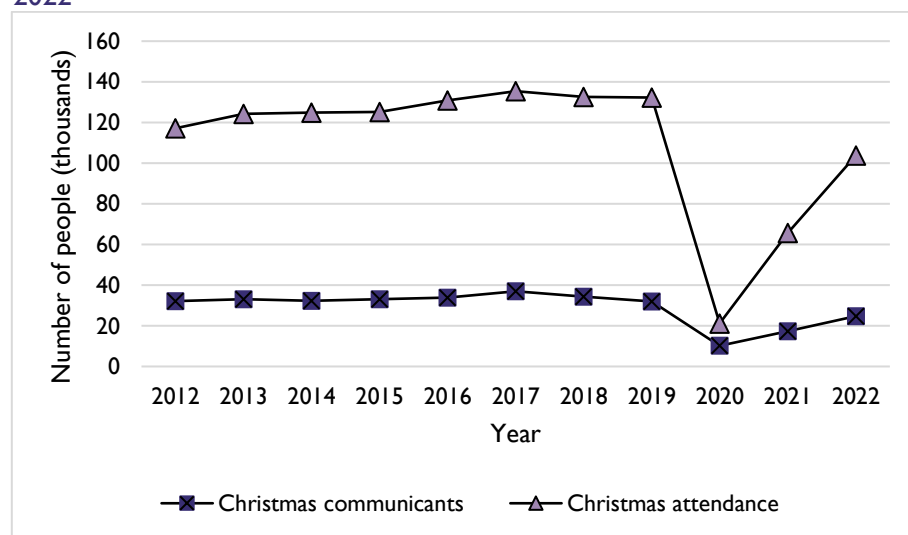
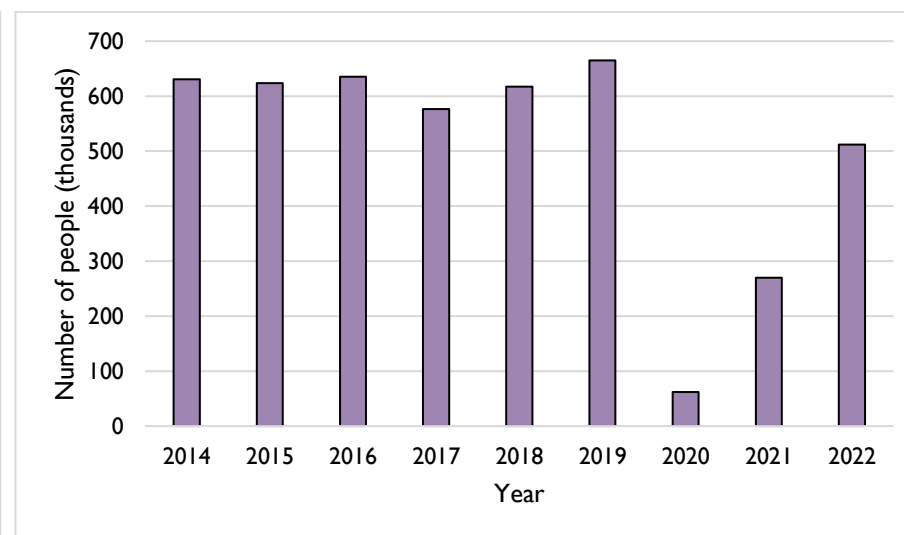


Figure 8b: Advent attendance 2014-2022⁷



In 2022, total reported attendance at Christmas services was 104,000. Of those who attended services at Christmas 2022, 25,000 received communion, 24% of those who attended.

A total attendance of 512,000 was reported at services during Advent in 2022.

Occasional Offices

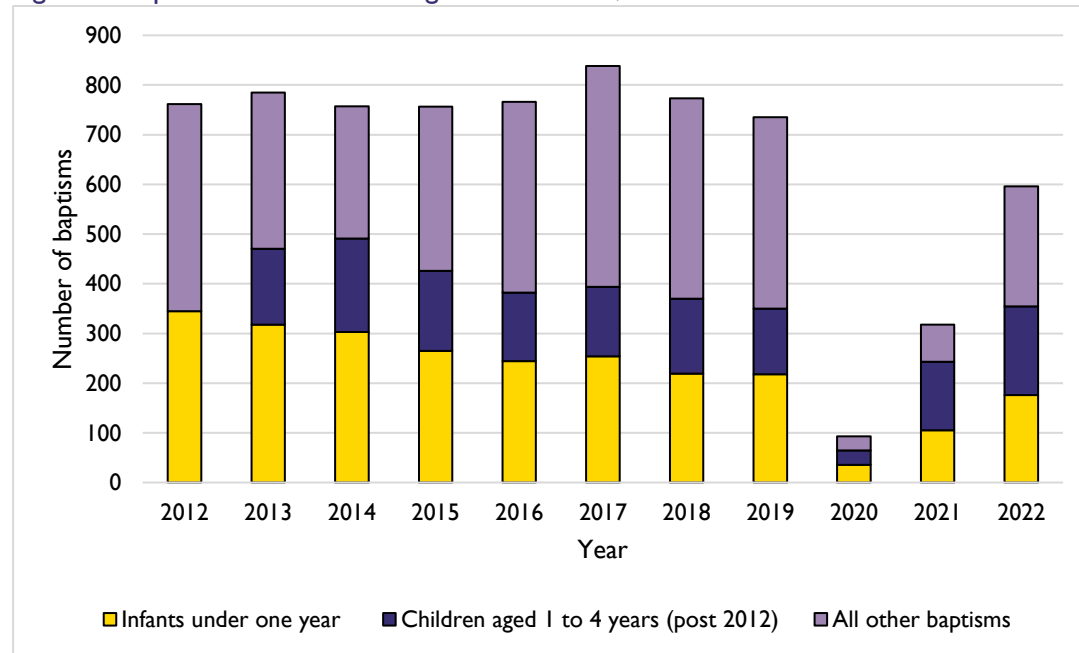
Baptisms and Thanksgiving services

During 2022, 600 baptisms were conducted in Church of England cathedrals. No thanksgiving services took place in 2022.

From 2019 onwards, baptisms have been recorded in five categories: infants under one year, children aged 1 to 4 years, children aged 5-10 years (previously 5-12 years), young people aged 11-17 years and 18+ years adults (previously youth/adult/13+ years).

For baptisms that took place in 2022, 30% (180) were of infants under one year, 30% (180) were of children aged 1 to 4 years, 9% (50) were of children aged 5-10, 15% (90) were of children aged 11-17 years, and 17% (100) were of adults aged 18+.

Marriage, Funeral and Memorial services

260 marriages were conducted in cathedrals during 2022. 35 blessings of marriage were conducted in cathedrals in 2022. The number of marriage services, shown in Figure 10, includes couples newly married in the relevant year, whilst blessings of marriage includes the number of couples for whom a service of prayer and dedication (after a civil marriage) was held in the cathedral, and does not include the renewal of vows.

Figure 10: Marriage services at Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022

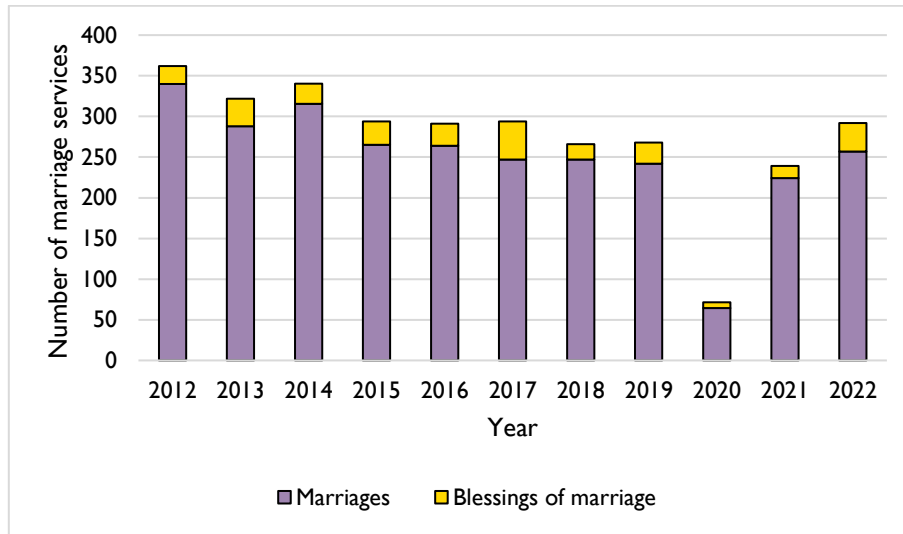
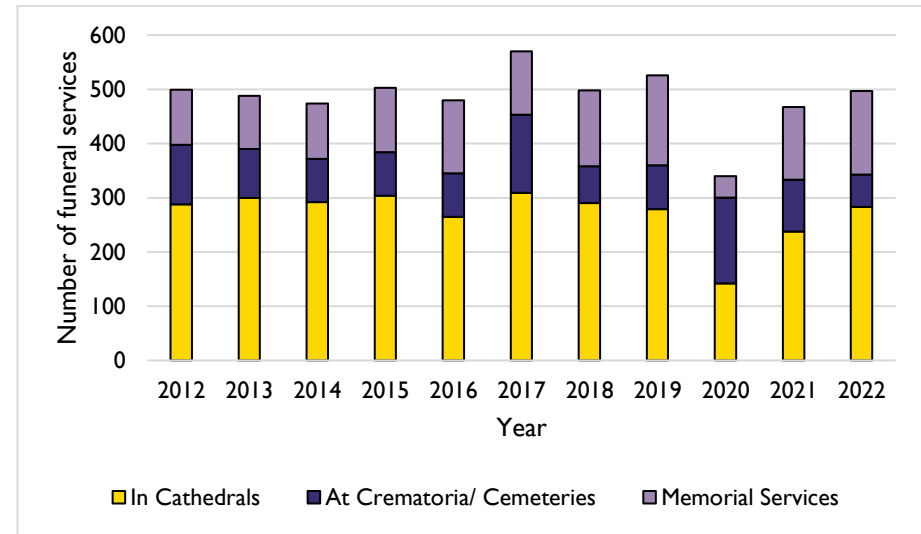


Figure 11: Funeral and memorial services at Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022



The total number of funeral services, shown in Figure 11, is broken down by the number of services held in the cathedral and the number of services conducted on behalf of the cathedral at a crematorium or cemetery (excluding committal or burial of ashes only). In each case, the number of funerals include those conducted on behalf of the cathedral or parish by any minister, including stipendiary, self-supporting and retired clergy. 340 funerals took place in or on behalf of cathedrals in 2022, of which 280 took place in the cathedral and 60 at a crematorium or cemetery. In addition, 150 memorial services took place in cathedrals in 2022.

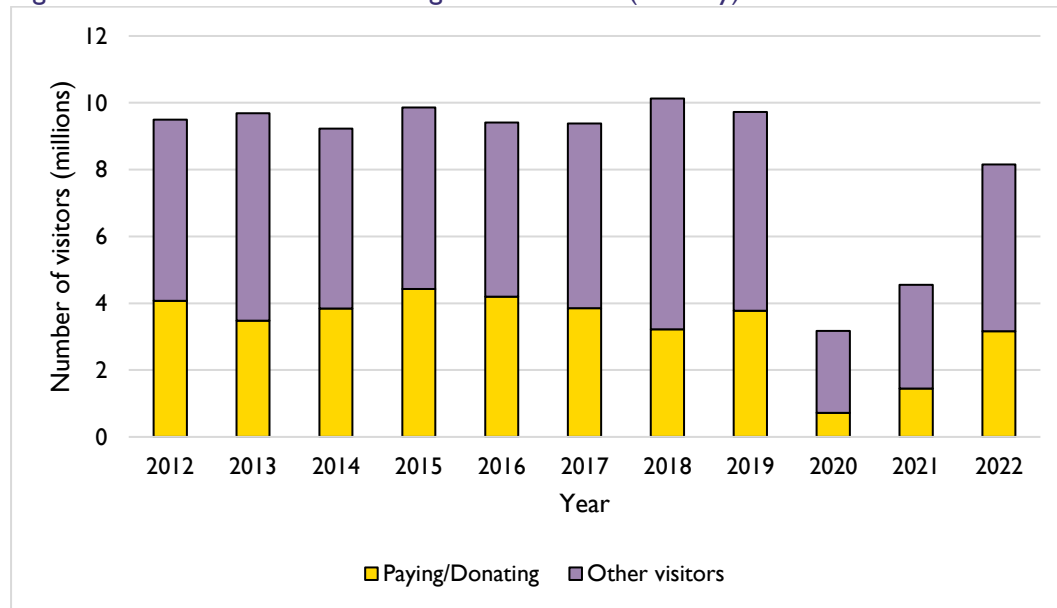
Visitors

The total number of visitors is shown in Figure 12. Visitors are recorded in two categories - those paying (either by donation or paying at point of entry) and those that did not pay. Visitor numbers exclude those people attending services and events mentioned elsewhere in this report.

In 2022, cathedrals reported 8.2 million visitors.

Just over half of the cathedrals reported paying or donating visitors. Paying or donating visitors accounted for 39% of all visitors (3 million people) to cathedrals in 2022. However, four cathedrals commented that they were unable to separate which visitors donated. One recorded all visitors as non-paying/donating, two recorded all visitors as paying/donating, and one recorded only visitors on ticketed tours as paying or donating.

Figure 12: Visitors to Church of England cathedrals (annually) 2012–2022

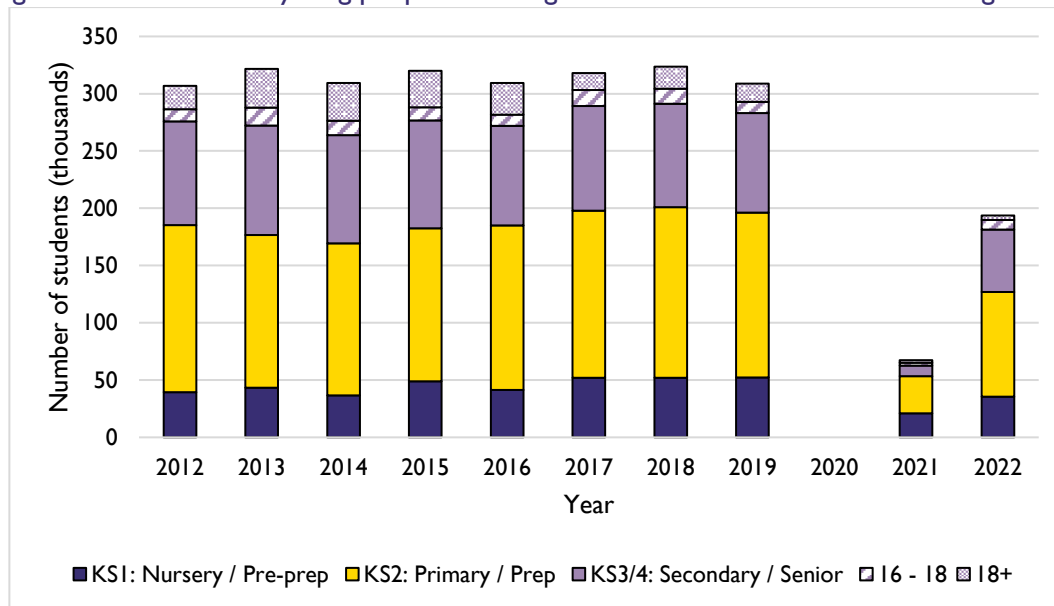


Education

Educational events

Figure 13 shows the number of children/students attending organised educational events during the year, which took place either in the Cathedral or were organised by the Cathedral and took place elsewhere, broken down by age / year groups⁸. The total number of children and young people attending organised educational events in cathedrals in 2022 was 194,000. Figures for educational events 2020 were not collected or reported, but would probably have been small given the pandemic-related restrictions that were in place for much of that year.

Cathedral schools

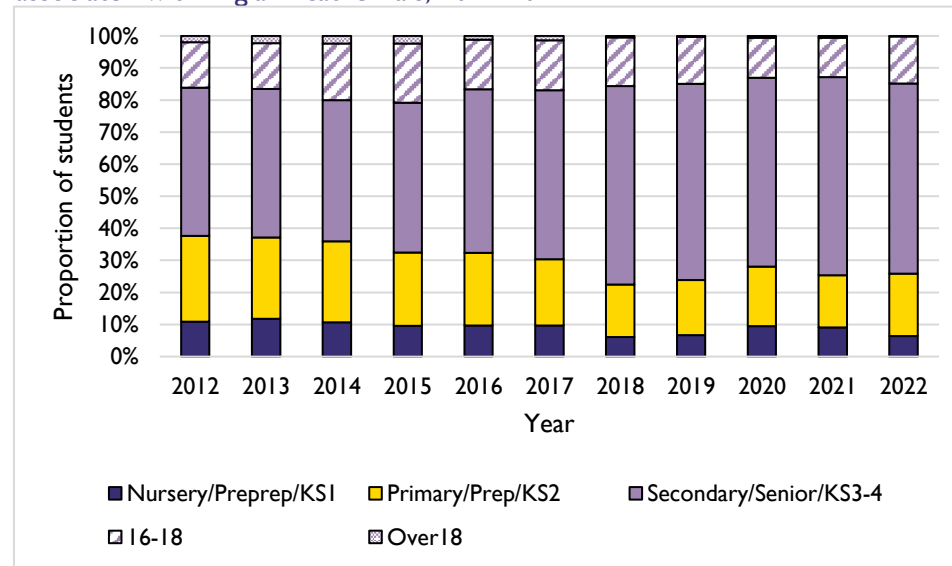
Figure 14 shows the proportion of students attending schools associated with Church of England cathedrals, broken down by age / year groups. Due to the differing number of cathedrals reporting each year, proportions rather than numbers of students are shown, to allow for year-on-year comparison; numbers of students can be found in Appendix I.

The data relate to schools or academies that are part of a cathedral foundation or have formal links/relationship with a cathedral during the academic year. From 2015, question wording was changed to clarify that this meant formal governance links.

As with Figure 13, until 2009 the Secondary/Senior category included ages 16-18 and 18+, from which point these age groups were reported separately. It should be noted that a larger number of cathedrals reported these data from 2015 onwards.

In 2022, 22,900 students were reported attending cathedral schools or schools formally associated with cathedrals. The largest proportion of those attending cathedral schools in 2022 was at secondary / senior level, which accounted for 59% of all students reported and consistently accounts for the highest proportion of students every year. Primary / prep accounted for the next highest proportion in 2022 (19%), followed by 16-18 year olds (15%), nursery / pre-prep (6%) and 18+ (<1%).

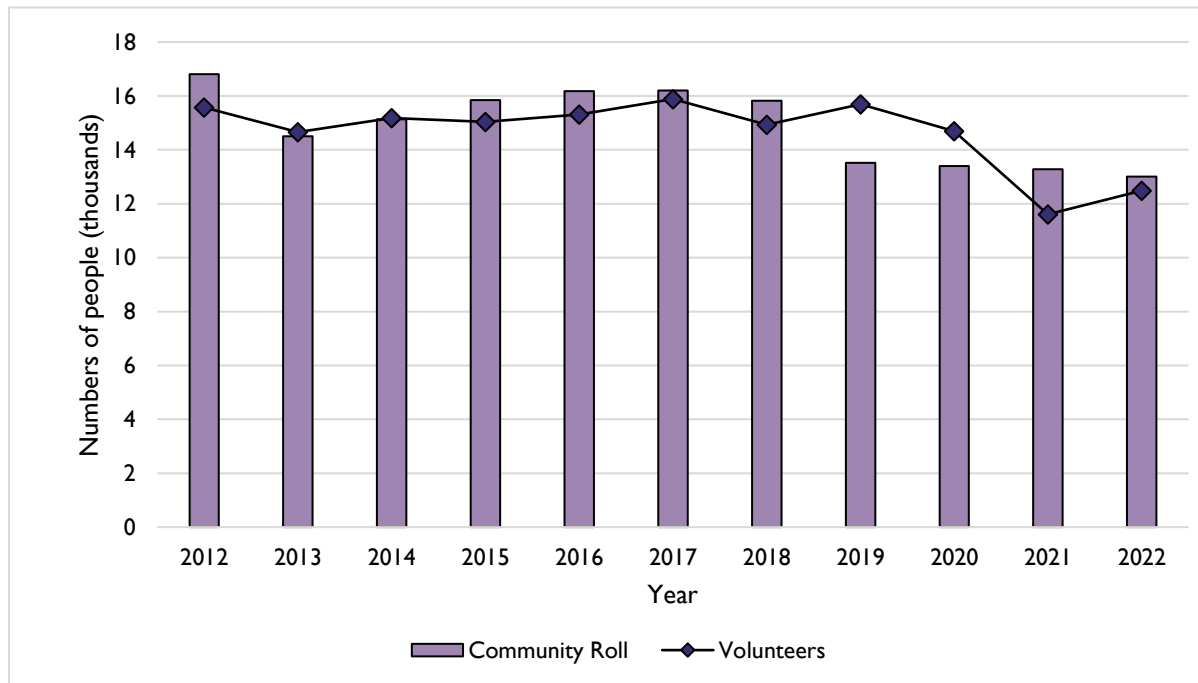
Figure 14: Proportions of children and young people attending schools associated with England cathedrals, 2012-2022



Volunteers and Community Roll

Figure 15 shows the total number of people volunteering at Church of England cathedrals (including servers, welcomers, stewards, flower arrangers, committee members and other unpaid posts). The number of people on the cathedral Community Rolls is also shown in Figure 15. Lay members aged 16 years and over, who are baptised and are resident in the cathedral parish or, if not resident, have habitually attended public worship in the cathedral during a period of six months prior to enrolment, are entitled to have their names entered upon the roll of a cathedral. The Community Roll was last renewed in 2019, which may account for the notable change from 2018 to 2019 and lack of change thereafter.

There were 12,500 people reported as volunteers in cathedrals during 2022.

13,000 people were members of cathedrals' Community Rolls in 2022.

Music in Cathedrals

Choristers and voluntary choir members

Figure 16 shows numbers of Choristers in Church of England cathedrals. Prior to 2013, only the total adult Lay Clerks / Choral Scholars figures were recorded; adults were split into men and women from 2013.

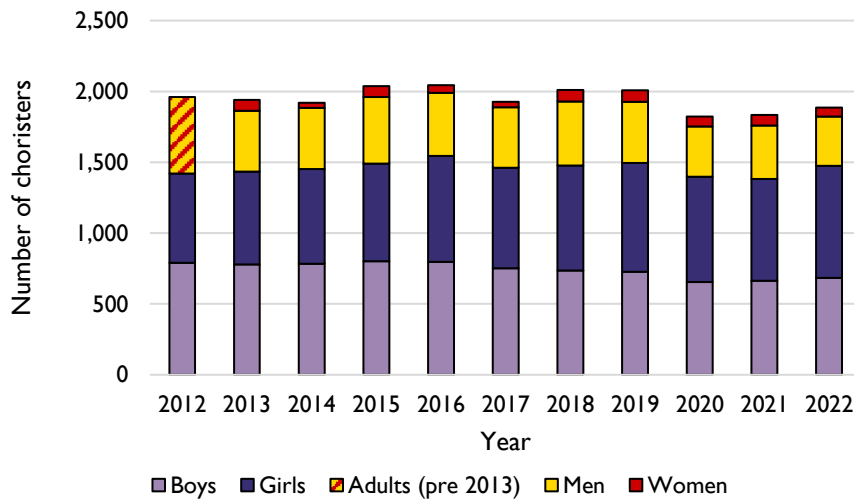
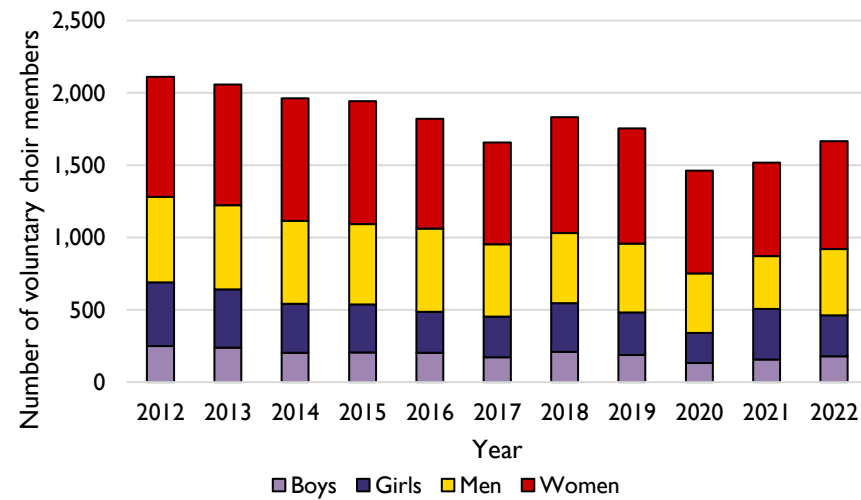


Figure 17: Voluntary Choir members, 2012-2022

Figure 17 shows numbers of members of voluntary choirs at Church of England cathedrals.

Figure 16: Choristers in Church of England cathedrals, 2012-2022

In 2022, 1,500 total youth choristers and 410 lay clerks / choral scholars (i.e. adults) were reported as providing choral music for cathedrals.

Voluntary choirs in 2022 reported 1,700 members. More volunteer choir members are adults (72%) compared to cathedral choirs (22%). Voluntary choirs contain more women than cathedral choirs; 45% of volunteer choir members were women in 2022, compared to 3% of cathedral choir members.

Number of choirs

In 2022, the numbers of male, female and mixed choirs in cathedrals were reported to be 35, 34 and 96 respectively. The number of visiting choirs in 2022 was reported to be 712.

Figure 18a: Number of Choirs in Church of England cathedrals, 2013-2022¹⁰

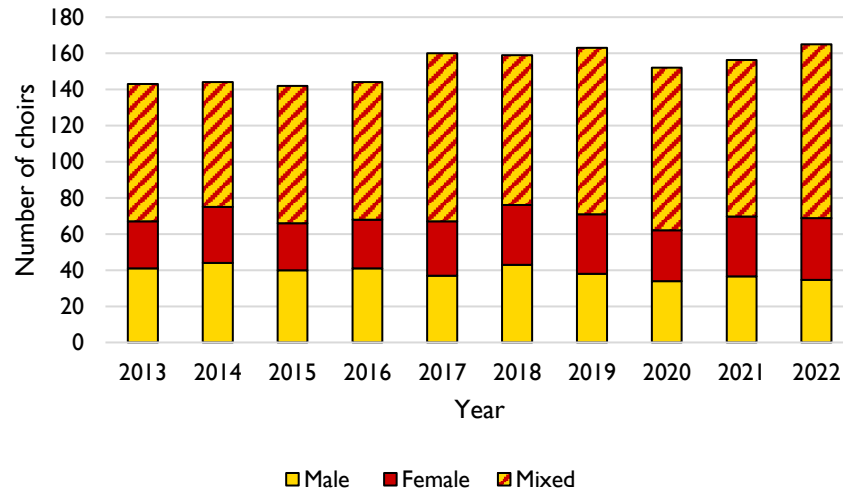
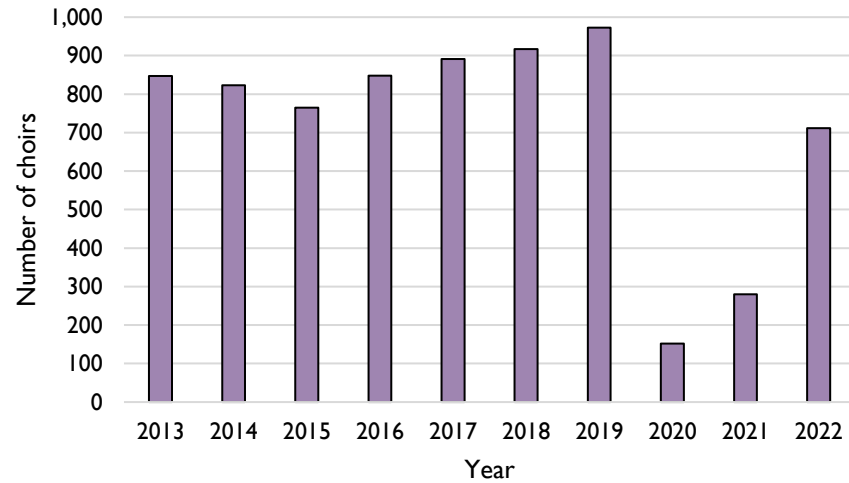


Figure 18b: Number of visiting choirs, 2013-2022¹¹



Musicians

In 2022, a total of 170 regular and 700 occasional musicians were reported as being involved in services at Church of England cathedrals.

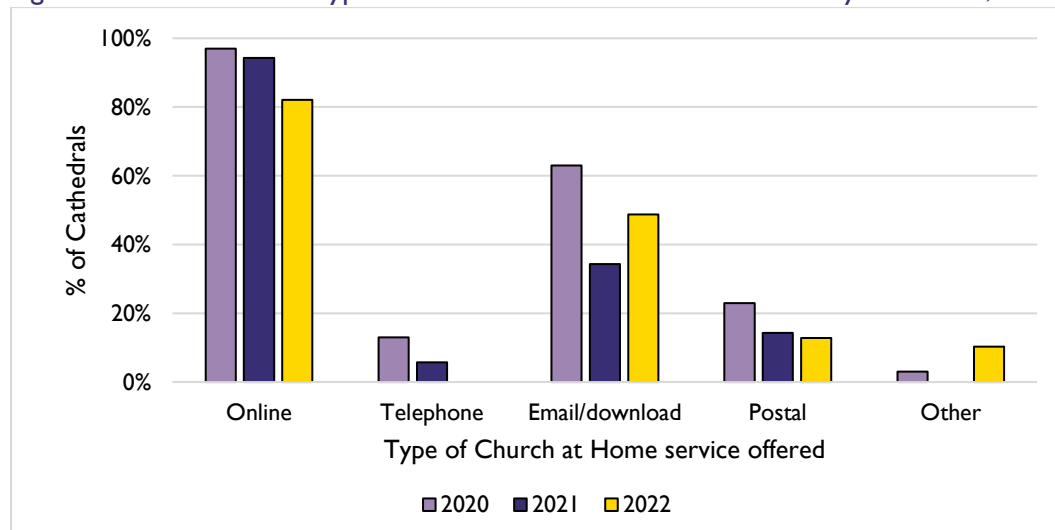
Church at Home

In March 2020, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, in-person collective worship was suspended. The 2020 Cathedral Statistics return was adapted to collect information about the “Church at Home” services – those services offered online, by phone, post, email, and other means – offered by cathedrals during the March-July 2020 lockdown, and during October 2020. Since then, many cathedrals have continued to offer this ministry.

Church at Home services can take a variety of forms, including online services that are live-streamed or pre-recorded; telephone or dial-in services; services that are downloadable from a website or emailed to the congregation; and services that are printed and posted or hand-delivered to members of the congregation. Cathedrals can potentially offer one or multiple types of Church at Home service.

85% of cathedrals offered Church at Home services in October 2022. Figure 19 shows the percentages of cathedrals offering each type of Church at Home from 2020-2022. Online services were the most frequently reported type of Church at Home, offered by almost all cathedrals that offered Church at Home services. The percentage of cathedrals offering online service decreased slightly between 2020 and 2021, with a further decline in 2022. Other types of Church at Home were less common, and were universally offered less frequently in 2022 than in 2020, but email/download was more common in 2022 than 2021.

Cathedral-level summary information

Every cathedral is different, serving different communities in different ways. There are many ways to describe the “size” of a cathedral, of which a few are shown in Table 2. This table gives a sense of the range of cathedrals. For example, the average Adult usual Sunday attendance in 2022 was 292 people; Adult usual Sunday attendance at the median (middle) cathedral in 2022 was 222 people; a quarter of cathedrals had Adult usual Sunday attendance in 2022 of 182 or fewer people; a quarter of cathedrals had adult usual Sunday attendance in 2022 of 297 or more people.

The map in Appendix 3 shows the location of all participating cathedrals from which data have been aggregated to show the totals reported in Figures 1 to 19 (names listed below, with diocese name in brackets if not already in the name of the cathedral). Westminster Abbey is not shown on the map because data from Westminster Abbey are reported separately via footnotes accompanying tables 3 to 18.

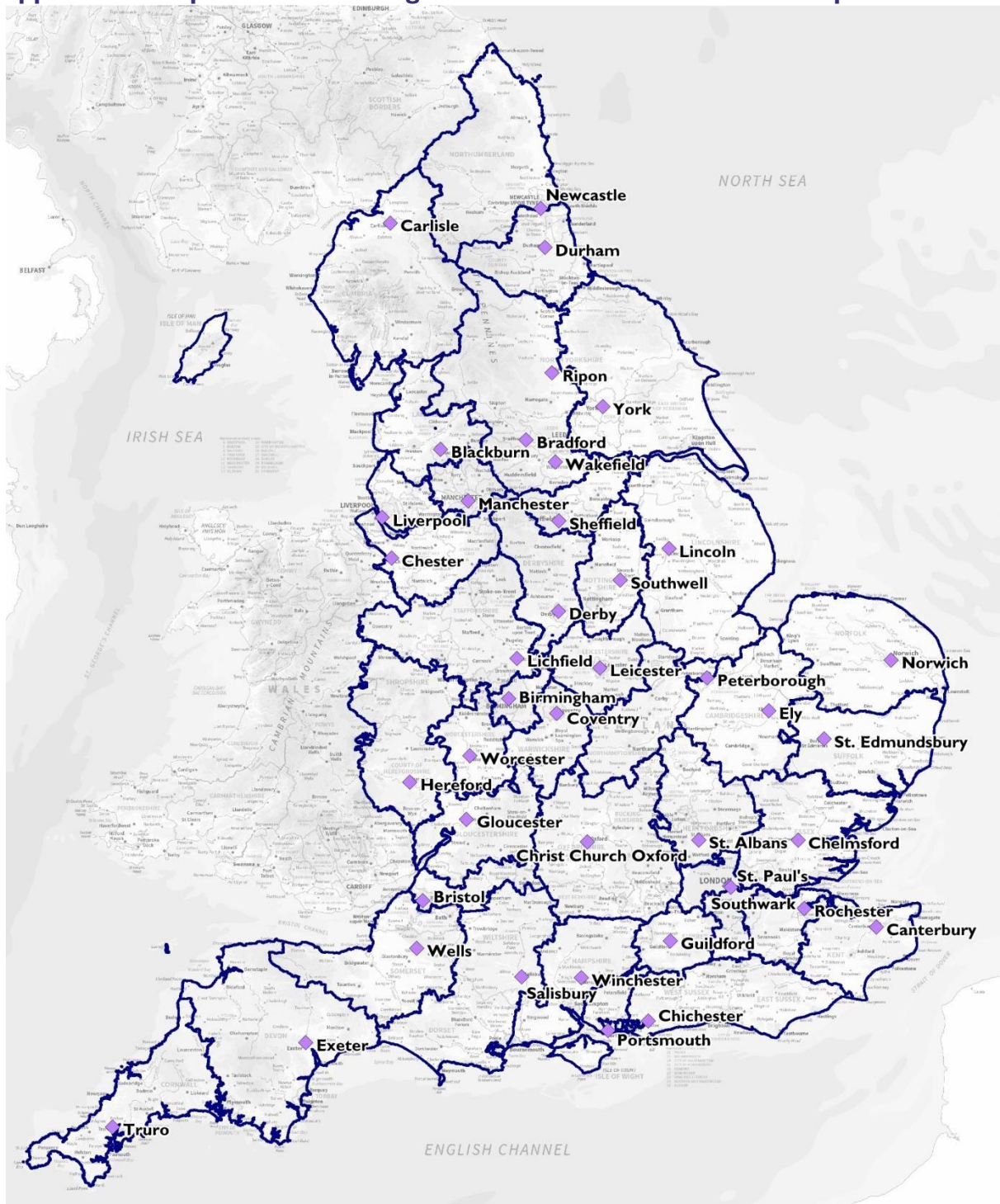

Data in this report have been collated from the annual cathedral returns completed each year by Head Vergers, Chief Operating Officers, and Deans. The form in Appendix 4 was sent electronically to all Church of England cathedrals, and Westminster Abbey, in early 2022. Data were checked upon the form being returned, and any anomalies or missing data queried directly with the cathedral and amended where necessary.

In the case of no response from the query, estimation was carried out based on previously held data. For each variable, an average value was calculated from the 2022 data. An average was also calculated from a subset of the 2019 data that included only those cathedrals for which we held data in both the 2019 and 2022 datasets. The proportion between the 2019 and 2022 averages was then calculated for each variable. Each variables' calculated proportion was then applied to the 2019 data for those cathedrals who had not submitted a return in 2022 in order to calculate imputed values for 2022. The sum totals reported in the tables of this report are the sum of all the reported and imputed values for 2022. The same process was used in 2021.

As has been the case since 2016, all visitor figures in this report are taken from the returns provided by cathedrals themselves and not from external sources; in reports prior to 2016, visitor figures for Canterbury, London, and Westminster Abbey were taken from www.alva.org.uk.

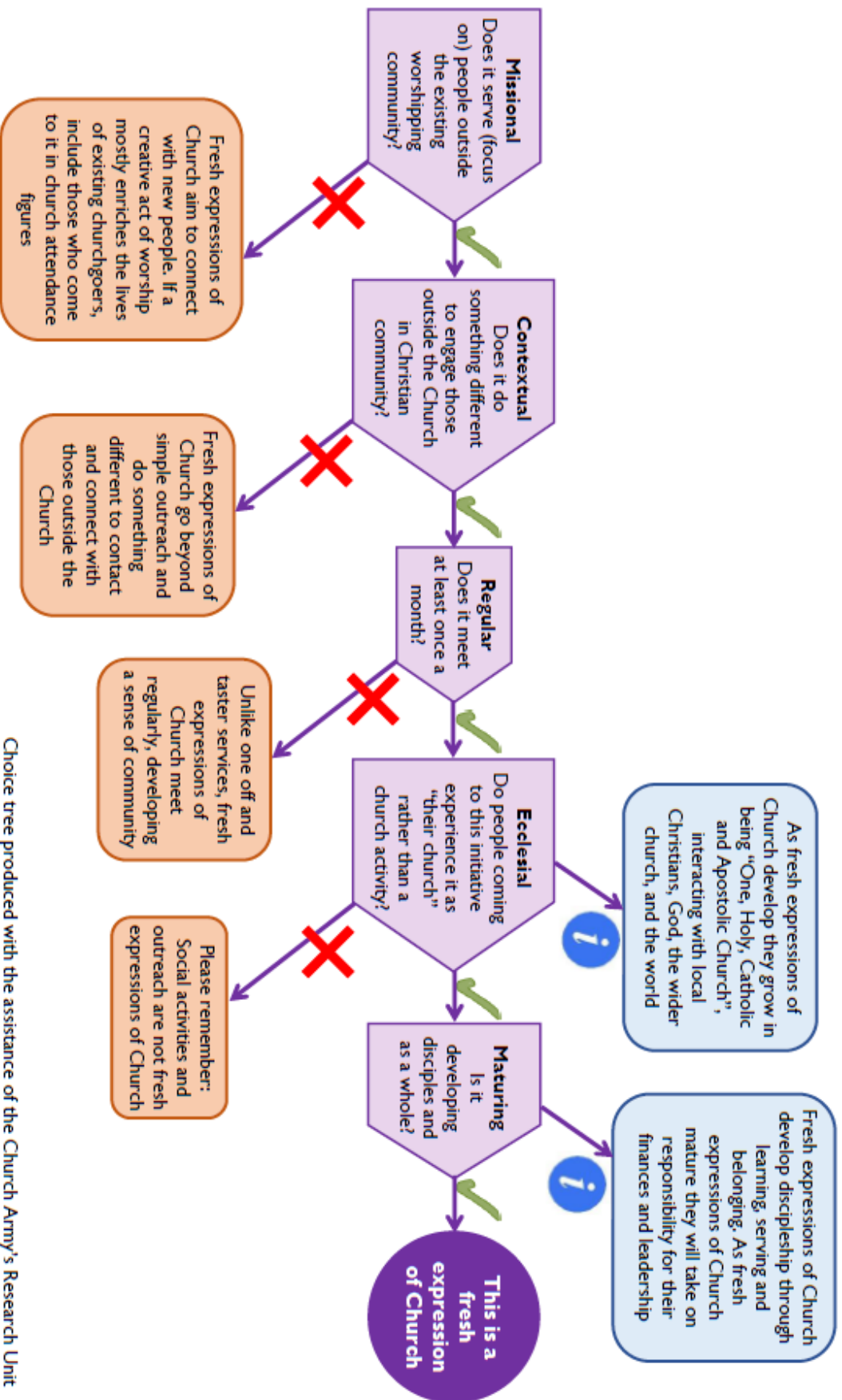
