Taught explicitly, they enable pupils to gain a good f their inherent messages. Consequently, pupils can relate them to their lived				



experiences. Additional monthly values, such as love and helpfulness, guide everyone. Pupils say the values give a meaningful framework for their lives. This has inspired them to request the addition of the value of peace for the holiday month of August.

The school's curriculum meets the needs of all learners. Leaders take bold decisions to enhance learning by asking pupils what they would like to explore. Consequently, forest school and cookery sessions are timetabled for everyone. Therapeutic provision, through emotion coaching and citizenship work, is also a mainstay, ensuring that pupils are resilient and ready to learn. Planned and unplanned opportunities for awe and wonder abound. The enhancement afternoons, alongside trips and visits, make valuable contributions to pupils' well-being and spiritual development. Strenuous efforts are made to support individuals sensitively, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND). As a result, pupils develop confidence. There is an impressive choice of after school clubs, which are well attended. They bring opportunities for pupils to feel successful. Pupils in the gardening club are excited to be making a contemplation area for the school. This experience is developing their resilience, teamwork and determination as well as providing opportunities for reflection. The school's soft federation with the Herefordshire Marches Federation of Academies benefits pupils. They now take part in a stimulating range of sport, dance and drama experiences beyond the school. Expertise is generously shared and, in turn, Clehonger inspires other non-church schools to develop a curriculum based on pupil needs.

Collective worship is an outworking of the Christian vision. It is enriched by a wide group of leaders, including those from the church and diocese. They bring diverse approaches to worship and celebrate the church calendar. Pupils eagerly participate. Bible stories and Jesus's teachings are the guiding light, illuminating the virtue of thinking of others. Everyone is encouraged to see themselves in the story and consider how they would act in different situations. This inspires pupils to live out their Christian values and promotes the school's harmonious ethos. Parents often attend weekly celebration worship, appreciating the impact it has on behaviour and personal development. Pupils are comfortable with prayer and prayerful language is natural to them. They recognise how this helps them to develop an inner calm. Prayerfulness is enhanced through community events, such as Messy Church and the 'Ascension prayer walk' to the local church. Music, candles and prayers contribute to a special sense of peace for all. A newly created 'reflection chair' offers a comfortable place for individual contemplation during the school day. Spirituality within worship has been effectively developed at Clehonger. This has been through regular opportunities for deeper reflection through discussion and prayer or stillness. Pupils and staff thus understand how spirituality can be a presence in their everyday lives. In this way they are developing a growing realisation of who they are and their place in the school community.

The school's Christian vision is rooted in a theology which speaks meaningfully to its community. Accordingly, this vibrant and compassionate school demonstrates its message of love at every turn. Leaders and staff are upheld by and consistently model the vision and values . Families are provided with practical support and a listening ear when needed. This effective practice creates an environment where wellbeing is enhanced. There is a deliberate focus on good mental health for both pupils and adults. It is supported through a designated teacher role. Consequently, pupils, including those disadvantaged and/or vulnerable, are encouraged to succeed. Pupils, staff and families say they feel lucky to be at Clehonger. This is because their views are both sought and considered, and they are treated with compassion and respect. They recognise that the ethos is inclusive and equitable, generating dignity for all.

Positive relationships exist throughout the school and pre-school. Pupils know that staff will always support them. Likewise, they are encouraged to look out and care for one another. From this secure base, they can see that small acts of kindness make a big impact. Christian values of self-control, respect and resilience help build strong friendships. Using the language of values, pupils are



increasingly able to reflect on incidents and resolve issues. They feel positive about helping one another and can balance the concepts of rights and accountability. In becoming 'responsibility rangers' pupils create a culture of justice. For example, pupils were recently inspired to give significant aid to a local family in distress. The school regularly supports local, national and global charities. Pupils' understanding of social action now needs to be developed so that they understand it on a wider global scale.

RE has a high profile in the school. Provision is balanced and well-structured because of purposeful monitoring and evaluation by leaders and governors. Pupils enjoy learning about people's beliefs, and the ways in which they are expressed and inter-relate. They relish opportunities to consider big questions in Christianity in the certainty that their opinions are valued. Currently some opportunities to deepen a curiosity, knowledge and understanding of religions and worldviews are missed within discussion and enrichment activities. Pupils have a growing awareness of Christianity as a global world faith. Through meeting a range of religious representatives, pupils appreciate that faith is a living experience. High-quality professional development through the diocese inspires leaders and governors to develop themes creatively. They therefore ensure the subject is well-resourced with books, artefacts and experiences to enhance pupils' engagement.

The inspection findings indicate that Clehonger Church of England Primary School is living up to its foundation as a Church school.
