Leaders have carefully constructed a rich and exciting curriculum that reflects the benefits and challenges of learning in a rural setting. Pupils are excited by the learning opportunities school provides and take pride in their work. For example, during a music lesson pupils sang with unbridled joy and enthusiasm as they learned a traditional song from Ghana. Meaningful links between subjects enhance pupils' learning journey and enable them to deepen their learning experience. Consequently, these strategic decisions are enabling pupils to live life in all its fullness. A clear understanding of the learning needs of each individual pupil is evident from all staff. As a result, pupils with a special educational needs or disability (SEND) are thriving within the school. Further opportunities for spiritual growth through the curriculum offer have been identified as a priority by school leaders. Steps to address this have already been taken as evidenced through a spirituality day led by the school chaplain and foundation governors. The curriculum consists of a rich tapestry of opportunity through the bold curriculum choices that leaders are making. As a result, pupils are flourishing.

A loving family culture permeates the relationships that are established and developed throughout the school community. Parents speak of the 'joyous' handover time at the end of the school day. A moment to discover the successes and challenges their children experience each day. Pupils take the responsibility of living out the school's 12 Christian values very seriously. They care deeply about one another and help each other to reflect on how they can live life in all its fullness. Reflective spaces around the school provide opportunities for pupils to share their worries and to have moments of stillness. A culture of inclusiveness and acceptance empowers pupils to be honest about the challenges they are facing. Pupils are respectful and courteous as they work alongside both new and familiar faces. Leaders have made intentional and strategic decisions to ensure that the wellbeing of staff is a priority for the school. Provision has been made within the structure of the school staffing to enable adults to grow and flourish. For example, staff are provided with regular opportunities to work with colleagues in local schools. Leaders ensure that pupils learn about communities and cultures around the world. They are taught about the rights of individuals and the principles of justice. Pupils use this knowledge and often want to make sure people further afield are treated well. This leads to actions such as toilet twinning projects abroad. However, they are not fully confident in challenging inequality and injustice without adult support.

Inspirational collective worship is at the heart of the school day. It is valued by the school community for its inclusiveness and transformational impact. Worship is planned, delivered, monitored and evaluated with an effective balance of pupil and adult involvement. The school's core Christian values underpin the themes for worship and links are made to local and world events. For example, how people responded to floods in the local area helped pupils better understand the concept of courage and trust in Jesus, linked with the Bible story of Jesus calming the storm. Worship, prayer and reflection play a key role in pupils' lives. This is clearly evidenced in the meaningful thoughts and feelings that are recorded across the school. Pupils talk about their own faith and beliefs with insightful reflection. Leaders have clear review and monitoring systems in place to evaluate the impact of worship. Pupils value times of collective worship and understand why this time is beneficial for people of all faiths and none. Regular visits from the school chaplain and local clergy support the spiritual growth of both pupils and staff.

Pupils learning experience during religious education (RE) expresses the school vision by ensuring pupils respect diversity of faith, belief and viewpoints. RE lessons provide opportunities for pupils to put forward their ideas and everyone's views are respected. Pupils say RE gives them confidence and



helps when they visit new places and meet people from different cultures and backgrounds. Leaders ensure that RE is a valued subject and that the curriculum responds to the context of the school. Careful consideration is taken to ensure each pupil has access to RE lessons that build upon previous knowledge. RE books continue with the pupils during each phase of school and enables pupils to reflect on their learning journey. Depth and challenge opportunities are provided so pupils find learning motivating. Leaders, including governors, regularly monitor and review the provision of RE in the school.

The inspection findings indicate that Melsonby Methodist Primary School is living up to its foundation as a church school.
