Show SESSION #3: Generous With Wealth (8 minutes)	

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Jonathan opens the session by pointing out that the lyrics of a particular Johnny Nash song are theologically profound when it comes to being generous with wealth: 'What is life? How do we live? What should we take and how much should we give?' Without thinking too long and hard (or giving the answer you think others would expect), how would you answer each of Johnny Nash's questions in the space of a post on X?

Jim Sheppard summarises the five stages of giving with five questions. Each stage takes us a step closer to understanding God's generous heart and how He wants us to use the resources He's given us.

Stage 1: What do I do with what I earn?

Stage 2: What do I do with what God has given me?

Stage 3: What does God want me to do with what God has given me?

Stage 4: What does God want me to give from what God has provided?

Stage 5: What does God want me to keep from what God has provided?

Discuss what shifts subtly in each of these discipleship stages. Which question are you asking? What would it take for you to move on to the next question? What one thing could you do this week or this month, to get there?

Jonathan says, 'The move from asking ourselves how much of *our* money should we *give away* to how much of *God's* money should we *keep* is one of *the* great discipleship challenges of generous giving.' **Do you use** an app or Excel or Sheets to draw up a monthly budget? If not, why not? What stops you from giving as soon as you earn (before saving or spending)? Which emotion fits you best: *Ordering my finances in this way (give, then save, then spend) makes me anxious / expectant / excited / relieved / stressed / grateful.*

Mary saw what she had as God's, so in pouring out the perfume she was just giving back what was already His. Her gift to Jesus cost a year's salary. It was incredibly generous – even extravagant. What had Mary just witnessed that would have made any gift to Jesus utterly insignificant in comparison?

Jonathan explains that the key to unlocking generosity is the realisation of God's extraordinary love for us. Mary was overwhelmed by this love and gave generously in response. If we have a nagging sense we should be

living more generously, the best thing we can do is not to look at our bank statements or a spreadsheet but to look at the life of Christ and to learn afresh what divine

to look at our bank statements or a spreadsheet but to look at the life of Christ and to learn afresh what divine generosity is. What would God have to do to convince you that you are completely loved by Him, and that there is no future point at which His love for you will end? What has God already done?

Mary's generosity with her wealth is immensely difficult for us to live up to because we live in a world telling us we are what we earn and own. There are limitless enticing ways to spend 'our' money, not to mention the crushing social pressures and expectations over what we should buy and how we should live, and the inescapable fact that debt is real: tiny houses come with huge mortgages. Describe how you experience this tension in your current season of life. Specifically, who or what is putting financial pressure on you?

To emulate Mary's generosity is difficult, but possible. The New Revised Standard translation of the Bible renders 'goodness' in Galatians 5:22 as 'generosity'. Generosity is part of the fruit that grows in a Spiritinfused life. The divine paradox is that we can't respond generously to God's generosity without His help. Praying that God gives us the spiritual gift of generosity is the starting point for a generous life. Do you ever ask God for more love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness, or self-control? Is generosity something you habitually pray for? If not, why not?

The irony of generosity is that we receive more than we give. How have you found this to be true in your life? Do you agree that, in God's economy, generosity produces more generosity? If you are mostly surrounded by people with a scarcity mindset, how might generosity create a culture of abundance?

Jonathan challenges us to be intentional about planning for generosity. Would you be up for the 1% challenge, in which every year you aim to give 1% more of your net income away? What kind of adjustment would this require of you?

BIBLE EXPLORATION

Read 2 Corinthians 9:6–11. What do these verses reveal about God's character? What's the promise? What's the prompt? Who or what makes you feel reluctant or pressured to give? Who strikes you as someone who always gives cheerfully?

Jesus said, 'For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.' (Matthew 6:21) What comes to mind when you think of your material life in relation to this verse? How would you explain the meaning of this verse to a seven-year-old?

Read the accounts of Jesus feeding five thousand men (Matthew 14:13–21) and Jesus turning water into wine (John 2:1–12). How do you know our nourishment and physical satisfaction is important to God? What else is important to God, as revealed in these stories?

Read Hebrews 13:5. If you really believed God would never leave or forsake you, would you be more generous?

LAST WORD

We can learn from Mary's example that our generosity with wealth should be more than a spontaneous act. Rather, it should be an ingrained way of being. Our intentional, purposeful generosity is a beautiful reflection of the gospel at work in our hearts and lives. As generosity becomes ever more who we are, we become ever more like the generous God who created us.

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DEEPER WALK

Select at least one activity below to complete before watching the next session.

Read: Read Exodus 16 in The Message. If you're already familiar with this story, what have you perhaps noticed for the first time? What is God saying to you about His provision in your life?

Write: Write down all the ways God has been generous to you this year so far. Now write down all the ways you'd love to pour out generosity on those around you, even if your ideas seem outrageous, extravagant, or impossible.

Pray: Meet with a couple of friends and pray for one another, asking God to make you all more generous with your wealth.
