

The Christian vision has been thoroughly researched, discussed and crafted to ensure that it meets the needs of its community. It is firmly rooted in the school's Christian foundation and is highly ambitious for the flourishing of everyone. It drives all decisions and actions including the formation of beneficial partnerships. This includes belonging to St Bartholomew's Multi-Academy Trust (the trust) whose vision and values align with those of the school. The programme of training means that adults are given many opportunities to further their skills and knowledge. Therefore, staff are highly motivated and knowledgeable. Added to this, the school and trust are passionate in ensuring everyone is well looked after. The trust has invested in many schemes looking after the health and wellbeing of staff. Inspired by the vision, leaders, including governors, work with determination to support the healthy work-life balance of staff. As a result, staff feel cared for and valued as part of the trust-wide family.

Governors and the trust are robust in their monitoring of provision and outcomes. They provide both support and challenge and ensure the school remains true to its Christian foundation. This is reflected in policies, procedures, curriculum planning and relationships. Leaders are ambitious for pupils to develop all aspects of their character. Because of this, the teaching of values has been woven into all aspects of learning. For example, in PE, pupils learn the importance of resilience and commitment and during history, kindness and respect. Therefore, they understand how the Christian values practised in school apply to the wider world. Furthermore, the positive behaviour policy and curriculum encourage relationships to be built on trust and forgiveness. This means pupils are enabled to flourish morally, spiritually, socially and academically.

Pupils are encouraged to develop a sense of responsibility. Each class studies the life and works of a chosen inspirational person. This relatively new addition to the curriculum inspires them to believe that their actions can help improve the world. Year 6 ambassadors, faith team, digital leaders, maths ambassadors and eco monitors all have important roles. This helps instil a sense of active caring for the needs of others. Every pupil is part of the whole school forum that explores ways to improve the school and wider world. This gives a voice to all, meaning they feel heard and valued by the staff. The United Nations Global goals are explored in depth by the Year 6 ambassadors who then present their findings through the school forum. These presentations are helping pupils to develop an understanding of matters of injustice. In some instances, pupils have then initiated actions such as a recycling campaign. Consequently, they are beginning to develop an understanding of justice and a belief that their actions can make a difference. However, this is at an early stage and pupils' understanding of this is limited to their own locality.

The exploration of spirituality is deeply embedded into the school day. There is a shared vocabulary used to discuss spirituality which is understood by pupils and staff. The approach of using the analogy of windows, mirrors and doors creates a pathway for discovering meaning. This forms an intrinsic part of the school's dialogue when considering and discussing spirituality. Therefore, everyone has the means to articulate their feelings, thoughts and beliefs. Daily meditation follows lunchtime and a sense of calm descends upon the school. The lights are turned low, soft music is played to prepare everyone. As an integral part of the day, it is valued as a time to 'just be' and to enjoy the stillness and silence. Because of this, pupils and staff are able to appreciate how moments of calm enhances their lives. Consequently, their awareness of their own spirituality is enhanced. Collective worship enriches the spiritual development of the community. It is varied in approach with times of reflection, prayer, song and stories. This means that different ways of worship are explored, allowing everyone to enjoy their preferred style. The fortnightly 'Open the Book' sessions are loved by all as a way of learning about the Bible through drama and interaction. The group



bring lively interpretations of Christian teachings to the whole school. These sessions enrich the worship life of the school and enhance pupils and adults' knowledge of the Bible. Church visits at times of Christian festivals help to build a sense of celebration, awe and wonder. The discovery and appreciation of God's creation is planned into forest school provision. Here everyone encouraged to take time in nature, finding beauty in the great and small. This deepens their lived experience of discovering their spiritual self.

Religious education (RE) deepens pupils' understanding of a range of worldviews and religions. The on-going development of the curriculum is researched, developed and evaluated with support from the trust and Lichfield Diocese. There is a careful sequencing of knowledge, skills and concepts that ensures a growing understanding of worldviews and global faiths. Knowledge organisers support teachers to ensure each unit of study is planned progressively. Key vocabulary, prior learning and concepts all support staff to deliver RE confidently. The curriculum is constantly being reviewed to ensure it is relevant and inspiring for each cohort. Leaders ensure that Christianity is explored from a world-wide view. The use of Christian art work and music from countries such as China help pupils to understand that Christianity is a global religion. Concepts are explored through 'big questions' like 'Does praying at regular intervals help a Muslim in his/her everyday life?' The starting point of discovery is always relevant to pupils' own experiences followed by the discovery of knowledge. Debates and discussions enable a growing understanding of the challenges and rewards living with a faith can bring. As a result, pupils are confident in articulating their own beliefs, views and spiritual convictions and those of others.

The inspection findings indicate that Gnosall St Lawrence is living up to its foundation as a Church school.
