Notice of Decision of Cathedrals Fabric Commission**

TAKE NOTICE that the Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Christ, Canterbury, applied on 20 June 2024 for retrospective approval of the following proposal:

The removal and safe storage of the Monument to Rev Christopher Naylor, East Cloister Walk, Canterbury Cathedral for safe stabilisation and conservation.

Summary of the application

A photographic and photogrammetric record of the monument has been made. A cotton gauze was be applied to the surface, with a weak solution of PVA to help it maintain its integrity while it was removed. The corbel pins were cut through. The plaque was removed in one (albeit distorted and fragile piece) and is being retained.

The monument was removed within the notice period of an FAC application as a matter of urgency as the health and safety risk was deemed to be too great to delay its removal.

TAKE NOTICE that the Chapter of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary and St Chad, Lichfield applied on 6th June 2024 for approval of the following proposal:

Repair of four bound manuscripts from the Seymour collection and one book, all of which are Outstanding Items on the inventory:

- MS Lich 002 'Poems by William Kingsmill: Vana, non ludibria carmina ventosa'
- MS Lich 025 Orders for the Household of the Prince of Wales, c.1640
- MS Lich 029 The Canterbury Tales
- MS Lich 068 The English Moore or the Mock Marriage
- LCL 6468 The Great Bible 1539

Summary of the application

The cathedral is applying for conservation of four items from the Seymour collection, which was bequested to the cathedral by Frances Devereux following the death of her husband William Seymour. The bequest dates to 1674, and is one of the oldest collections of books in the cathedral library. Additionally, the cathedral is applying for conservation of the Great Bible, 1539.

Each of the items requires a bespoke package of work to conserve the material and history of the item. Typically, this includes cleaning and repairing of loose pages and covering material.

Decision

TAKE NOTICE that the Chapter of the Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity, St Peter, St Paul and St Swithun, Winchester applied on 25 August 2023 for approval of the following proposal:

Conservation works to masonry and stained glass to the west-most bay of the South Nave Aisle.

Summary of the application

Repairs include cutting-out of cement, replacement of stone, mortar repairs, repair of lead hopper and downpipe, conservation of stained glass and installation of panels of external protective glazing to ten traceries and eyelets containing medieval glass.

TAKE NOTICE that the Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Saint Peter in York (York Minster), applied on 10 May 2024 for approval of the following proposal:

Permission to vary the scope of works currently consented to for pinnacle s10, viz., new stone to the pinnacle (as has been approved for the two adjacent pinnacle structures) rather than a mixture of renewal and repair.

Summary of the application

The whole pinnacle will be re-carved in magnesian limestones, as was consented for the two adjacent pinnacles s8 and s9. The application also covers the re-carving the grotesques. The reason for this change arises from structural investigations, revealing additional embedded iron, and closer inspection from scaffolds of the condition of the existing stones – which is a mix of poor quality Ketton with mag-lime.

In accordance with the stonework policy, the pinnacle will be fully recorded by the Cathedral Archaeologist with the Stoneyard team before deconstruction. The pinnacle would then be taken down and rebuilt with renewed magnesian limestones from two quarries. The new carvings will be undertaken in accordance with the 2024 Stone Practice policy.


